Ethel Barrymore Shocks Toronto

TORONTO, April 15 — (By The Canadian Press)—Ethel Barrymore, dignified scion of America's stage royalty, shocked a cultured audience at the Heliconian Club today when she casually remarked she would "probably never come back to Toronto" because Toronto has not come to see her current play.

"Why should I," asked the 52 year old actress, a smile playing about the corners of her sensitive mouth. "Excepting—or accepting—myself, the play 'The School for Scandal' has never been better presented. And to present Sheridan in the modern day, when there is very little fine speaking, is a difficult thing.

"Nobody has come," Miss Barrymore said. "Maybe you don't like classics here."

Would Confiscate Large Fortunes

OTTAWA, Ont., April 15 — (By The Canadian Press)—Abolition of the right to inherit large fortunes was urged in the House of Commons tonight by Miss Agnes MacPhail, Prog., South East Grey. She also endorsed the suggestion of Robert Gardiner, United Farmer Leader, that all incomes in excess of \$25,000 be confiscated. Canada was "in a jam" and the load of taxation was approaching the breaking point for the great mass of the people.

"Go for the taxes where the money lies," the Finance Minister was advised by Miss MacPhail, the only woman member of the House, the natural and most fruitful hunting ground was the field of large incomes.

"I do not understand why money should be inherited in large amounts," proceeded Miss MacPhail, while the House assumed a stony silence. This practice meant enslavement for one class of children and opulence for the other. Confiscation of large incomes and inherited money would provide the treasury with revenue for use in social lines and would relieve the tax-at-on-burden of the great mass of the people.
