MISSION URGENT

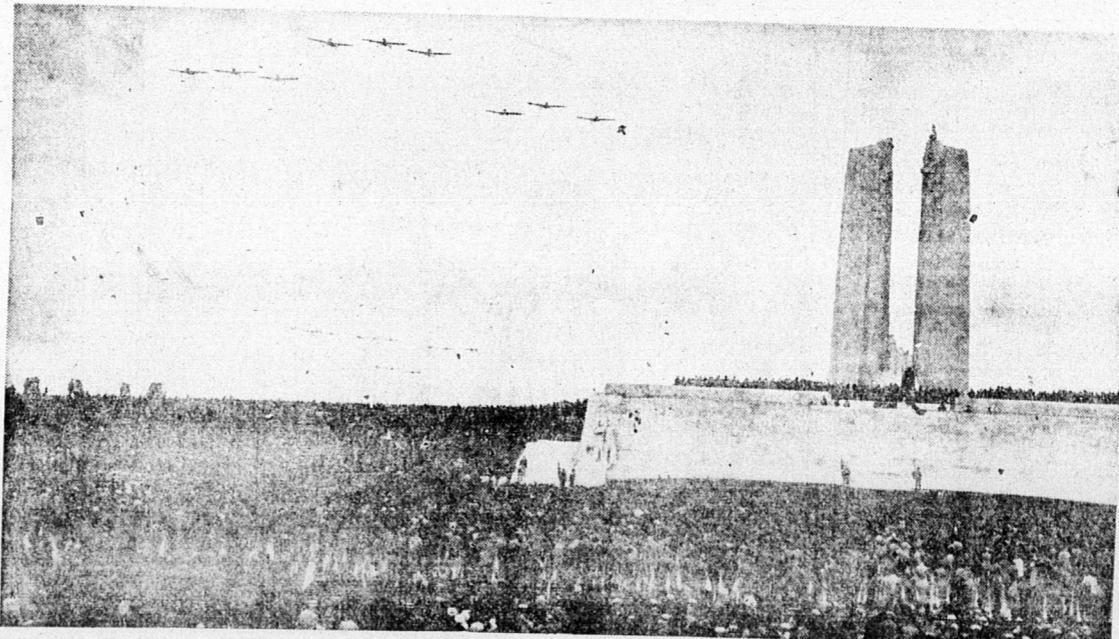

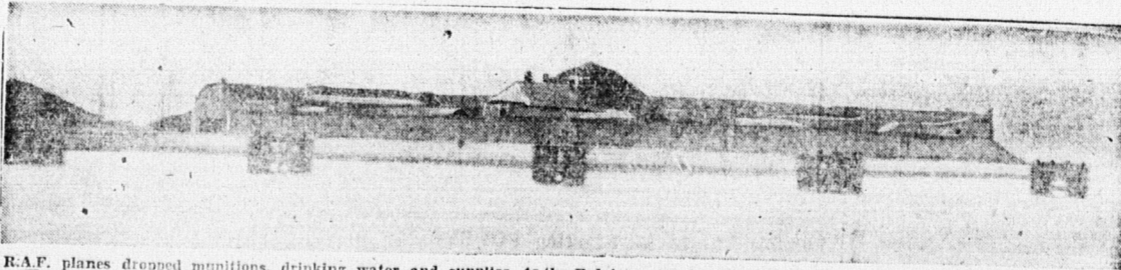

Deliberately dive-bombing at Canada's massive Vimy Ridge memorial in Flanders, German planes have smashed to pieces this tribute to Canadian troops killed in the last war. The planes were then said by an eye-witness to have bombed British, French and Canadian military cemeteries in the vicinity. The memorial, which

stands on 240 acres presented to Canada by the French government, is seen here as it was unveiled in 1936 by King Edward VIII in the presence of thousands of Canadian veterans. It was at Vimy Ridge on April 9, 1917, that 100,000 Canadians stormed to victory. Its 20 figures, designed by Walter Allward, Canadian sculptor, represent peace, justice, truth, knowledge, sacrifice and honor.



R.A.F. planes dropped munitions, drinking water and supplies, to the Belgians at Leige. Fortifications are shown here at the entrance of a small, heroic garrison of British soldiers in the mosted city of the harbor of Calais, which Germans boastfully claimed to have captured some time ago.



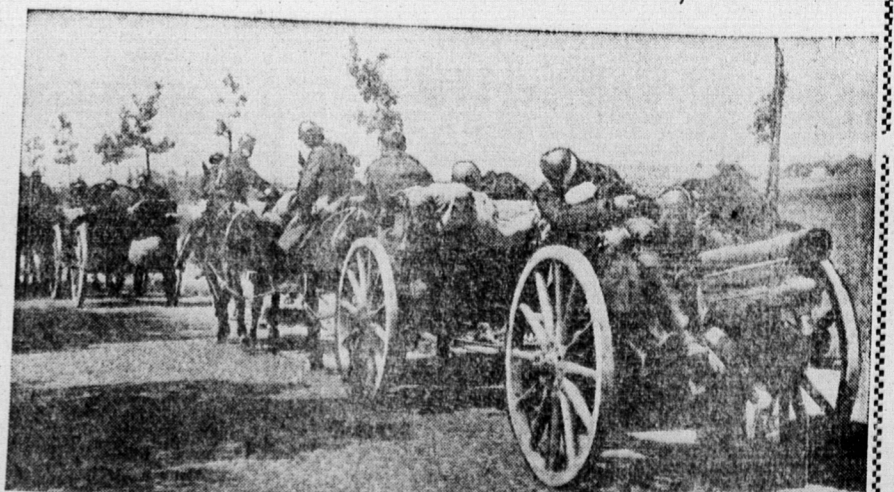
National director of National Unity party legionnaires, Major Scott Montreal (left foreground) is seen outside provincial police headquarters in appearance.
