MONTEAL, Sept. 12—No price changes occurred on the Montreal daily and produce market during today's rather dull trading, all lines holding firm. Stocks in storage in the Dominion as of September 1 were announced yesterday with substantial increases over last year being shown by butter, cheese and storage eggs, while fresh eggs showed a decrease. It is expected by local dealers that from now on there will be good export shipments of butter, cheese and eggs which will reduce the stocks to some extent. Cheese demand of late has been better and butter exports have also started up with weekly shipments looked for. It is understood that the west, where butter stocks are showing general increase, has sold some good blocks of stock for shipment before the end of the year.

On the butter market today, No 1 grade in cartons or less sold for 19 cents a pound unchanged from yesterday, with offerings totalling 80 boxes. Graded shipments in cartons or less of Ontario eggs continued at 22 to 23 cents a dozen for 17 to 18 cents for firsts and 13 1/2 to 14 cents for seconds, with westerns slightly less. Arrivals were 2,007 cases. Cheese held at 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cents a pound for Ontario and half a cent less for Quebec cartons, with 7,022 boxes. New Quebec potatoes in 50 pound bags remained at 75 to 80 cents.

CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

Grain cutting is nearing completion in the Prairie Provinces and threshing is well advanced. The quality of the crop marketed to date has been high. Private estimates place the Prairie wheat yield at approximately 270,000,000 bushels. Recent rains, while delaying harvesting operations, have improved pasturage and late feed crops. In Quebec the cereal crop is proving about average, except in the case of oats, which are heavy in some districts and under average in others. In Ontario threshing has been well advanced under favourable conditions. Barley is of good quality and shows a fair yield, and a short oat crop of fair quality is indicated. Fruit crops are progressing satisfactorily. In the Maritime Provinces grain yields are showing somewhat under average, potatoes promise an average crop and the apple crop outlook is excellent. In British Columbia the third crop of alfalfa is making good progress. Threshing of grains is now general, although delayed by rain in some districts. Details follow:

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Growing conditions have been generally favorable and crops are making good progress. Cutting of grains is nearing completion and threshing is fairly general. Potatoes have improved; a yield slightly under average is indicated. Other root crops promise well. Corn is in good condition. Cutting of tobacco is under way and though the crop has made good progress during the past fortnight the yield is expected to be below average. Pasturage is fair.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Corn is ripening rapidly. Root crops have been adversely affected by insufficient moisture and potatoes, turnips and mangels will be a light crop. Pastures are badly parched in some sections. Harvesting of tobacco is under way but, due to lack of moisture, some plants have suffered from rim fire, which may affect the yield. A fair peach crop has been marketed and while, due to dry weather, some drooping of apples has occurred, indications continue good for an average yield. Fall ploughing is general.

MARITIME PROVINCES

Weather conditions have been favorable and crops are maturing satisfactorily, having been benefited by widespread rains. Harvesting of grains is becoming general. Potatoes promise to be of good quality. Other root crops are progressing favourably. A yield of apples well over average and of good quality is indicated. Pasturage has been improved by recent rains.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Grain yields of approximately 90% of average are indicated. Potatoes are doing well. Harvesting of onions has commenced and ripe tomatoes are moving very freely. Prospective yields of the above crops are 85%, 150% and 100%, respectively. Pears, peaches and plums are moving in volume and apple picking is becoming general. A large crop of hops is now being picked in the Fraser Valley.

PARIS, Sept. 11—Flowers and feathers add a glamorous note to the new evening frocks launched by Molyneux.

Frocks of shimmering green lame or old gold velvet, designed on a slender, sinuous silhouette with feather-decked capes or flower bordered décolletés.

Little detachable waist-length capes are a favorite accessory. One luminous gown of green and rose gold lame is worn with a little ostrich feather cape dyed in the same shimmering tones and a midnight blue velvet gown is accompanied by a feather cape shading from light blue to midnight.

Feathers add a worldly touch to the bodice of several gowns. A slender old gold velvet has a vaporous thread of brown ostrich trailing down the front of the corsage.

Trim wool ensembles make the bulk of the daytime clothes. A big muff and a small toque made of the same fur as the coat trimming often complete the ensemble.
