BLUENOSE SKIPPER STILL BEFORE THE PUBLIC EYE

Stands by His Position and Does Not Intend to Apologize to Committee—Captain Angus Explains Whole Situation.

HALIFAX, Nov. 6.—Captain Angus Walters insists that he is not sorry for his action at Halifax on Friday last in taking Bluenose home to Lunenburg and leaving the 1923 International Series "up in the air." Yesterday morning the Halifax newspapers credited the following statement to him:

"On reflection I regret the effects of my action. I was under great strain. I am a fisherman, not a sportsman. I acted hurriedly and did not realize that other people were so largely interested."

During the forenoon yesterday Captain Walters called up Halifax on the long distance phone and repudiated this statement insofar as it gave any suggestion that he was "sorry" for what he had done. Now, in a letter to The Morning Chronicle, he admits he made a statement that he "regretted any effects his action may have had on the public at large who were not in a position to understand why he refused to sail another race and took the Bluenose home, but I am not trying to crawl out of any hole for the benefit of the Sailing Committee. That was the only statement I made for publication. I certainly believe that after they had given their decision disqualifying Bluenose they could properly have recalled it on my protest."

There is no comparison between the case of the Bluenose this year and the Henry Ford last year. In the Gloucester case, soon after we crossed the starting line a boat was sent after us and hailed us to return as we both had made a mistake. I did make an attempt to come back, but Morrisey did not, therefore I set back our sails again and we kept on. When Bluenose made this so-called mistake on Thursday morning at Halifax no attempt was made to make it known to us until some time that evening. The gun was fired as we came over the line, and that gun declared Bluenose the winner.

Now, in closing, I will say again that I am not sorry for any action of mine at Halifax, and I do not intend to make any apologies to the Halifax Committees.

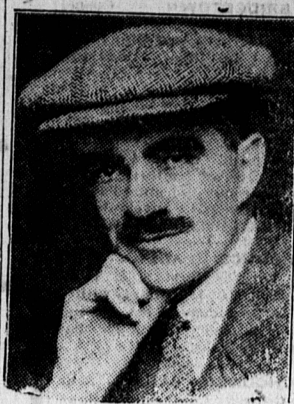

Sir,—Just a few lines in regard to what appears in the Halifax newspapers stating that I am sorry for not sailing another race off Halifax this year. I am not sorry for anything I have done, from the start to the finish of the races I sailed this year with the Bluenose. We won two fair and square races.

as fair and square as ever were and ever will be sailed by two fishing vessels. I did make a statement regretting any effects my action may have had on the public at large, who were not in a position to understand why I refused to sail another race and took the Bluenose home, but I am not trying to crawl out of any hole for the benefit of the Sailing Committee. That was the only statement I made for publication. I certainly believe that after they had given their decision disqualifying Bluenose they could properly have recalled it on my protest.

The statement attributed to Captain Walters was published in The Morning Chronicle in good faith, having been furnished by the Canadian Press. It has since been learned that it was suggested to Captain Walters by C. F. Bond, of the National Cash Register Co., who happened to be in Lunenburg on Saturday and thought that some such utterance from Captain Walters would do much to clarify the situation. The skipper of the Bluenose would not sign the statement, but Mr. Bond says, agreed to it in the presence of the Mayor of Lunenburg. Mr. Bond brought the communication to Halifax on Saturday night and handed it over to H. R. Silver, chairman of the Trustees of the International Trophy.

WILL PLAY AT ST. JOHN IN JANUARY

HARRY WILLS KNOCKED OUT JACK THOMPSON

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 6.—Harry Wills, New Orleans heavy weight title contender, all but knocked out Jack Thompson, of Boston, last night in the fourth round of a 12-round match at the First Regiment armory.

Thompson's seconds threw a towel into the ring as he went down heavily for the second time in the round from a battering attack to the head and ribs. A right upper cut sent the Boston negro down to his knees and he took a count of nine. He arose only to meet another withering drive and reeled about the ring but it required a fusillade of carefully timed punches before Wills was able to bring down his man. Referee Henry Lewis had counted three over the prostrate negro when a towel came hurling into the ring.

ENGLISH DERBY WINNER SOLD

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Guessing the identity of the new owner of Papyrus and the sum paid for the famous colt is the latest diversion of followers of horse racing in England. Those able to give out the desired information refuse to do so, but latest reports are that the buyer of the Derby winner is either Basil Jarvis, his trainer, or somebody who has long been associated with Jarvis' stable.

As regards the price, the racing reporter of the Daily Telegraph says it exceeded the £31,500 paid for Diamond Jubilee, which won the Derby in 1900 when Edward VII was Prince of Wales.

This afternoon's newspapers announce that J. P. Hornum, head of a London firm of sugar merchants has purchased Papyrus. The price paid for the Derby winner was not divulged. Mr. Hornum, it was added, intends to race Papyrus next season.
