—GREAT BRITAIN AND THE WAR.—Rev. Dr. Campbell of Sackville will deliver his lecture on Great Britain and the War in the Methodist Church, Kensington on Monday evening, February 7th, at 7.30 o'clock. While Dr. Campbell is on the island in the interest of the educational work of the Methodist Church he has kindly consented to give the lecture on the war and devote half of the proceeds to the Red Cross Society, this will give the people of Kensington and surrounding countries a splendid opportunity to hear this well known orator. 7167-2-5-M11.

—POLICE COURT.—The charge of fraud against Louis Acker on information of Mr. A. E. Long, Charlottetown, was heard in Police Court at Summerside on Thursday, when after hearing the evidence of Mr. Long, Conductor Munro, Joseph Praught, checker in Charlottetown freight house and Peter Carter for Mr. Long, the prisoner was sent up for trial at next term of Supreme Court in June. The facts of case, as shown by the informant, Mr. Long, shows that on Jan. 21st, he bought from Acker, at the latter's warehouse in Summerside, 118 hides, besides a number of horse hides and pelts. Acker was to have shipped the lot that day but did not do so until the next day (Saturday) but too late for train of that day. The hides arrived in Charlottetown on Monday evening and when Mr. Long went to take delivery he found that a large part of the hides were not what he had purchased and tied up with his tag on them. In the consignment there should have been 43 hides packed in seven barrels, the latter were delivered but contained instead of the 43 hides, 46 pieces of hides and a number of pelts. The total weight of the shipment should have been 5,020 lbs. whereas the weight of that delivered was less than 2,500 lbs. The defendant offered no defense, his lawyer, Mr. Johnston reserving same for Supreme Court.—C.

—SUCCESSFUL SOCIAL.—The ladies of the Red Cross Society of Alma, who recently held a pie social here are to be congratulated on the success of their enterprise. The night being perfect and the roads good, a very large crowd gathered from the distant parts of the country and filled the school to its utmost capacity. There was also a musical programme in connection, consisting of patriotic choruses, recitations and solos which were very well rendered. Special mention might be made of the song "Khaki" by Mrs. Minnie Marchbank, which was sung in such a way as to win vigorous applause from the audience. This was followed by rousing speeches by Lieutenant Dawson of the 105th "C" Company Summerside and Dr. Jardine E. D. of the same place who were introduced by the chairman Rev. Mr. Lochart. Lieut. Dawson gave a brief description of the war, its causes and its horrors. He entreated the young men to uphold the colours which in the end would be victorious and bring a lasting peace. He also trusted that mothers and fathers would put no obstacle in the way of their boys enlist-

ing if they thought it their duty to do so. He spoke of the young men of Alma, who donned the "Khaki" in the year (1914-1915). He said, "We should all feel proud of them, they are doing so well." Lieut. Dawson then asked all those who wished to enlist to come forward to the platform. Great enthusiasm was manifested by the large audience as six young men came forward and joined the honour roll. A vote of thanks was then tendered the speakers and three rousing cheers proposed by Mr. Lochart, were given them. A vote of thanks was also tendered to the ladies of the Alma, Branch of the Red Cross for the good work they are accomplishing notwithstanding many drawbacks and inconveniences which they endure. Pies were then offered being ably auctioned by Mr. Alvi Mountain and were not knocked down until the highest figures procurable were obtained. The handsome sum of \$56.00 in all was realized, which goes towards buying yarn to be knitted into socks for our Island boys in the trenches or on the battlefield. The ladies wish to thank all who, in any way, helped to make the social a success.

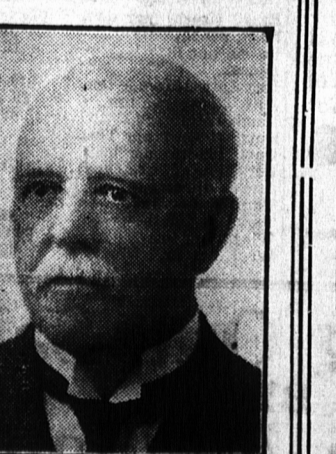

—Messrs John P. Gaudet, Miscouche and John E. Yeo, Northam, were inward passengers on Thursday.—H.

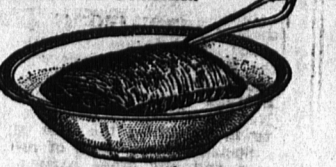
—The many friends of Miss Marjorie Chisholm, Tryon, will be glad to hear she is recovering from an attack of la grippe.—H.
