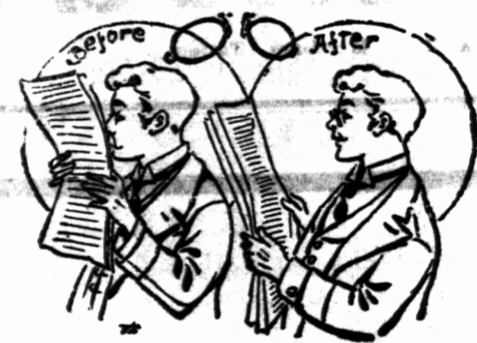

**Popular Canadian Play-
ground.**

The traffic over the Grand Trunk Rail-
way System to the summer resorts located

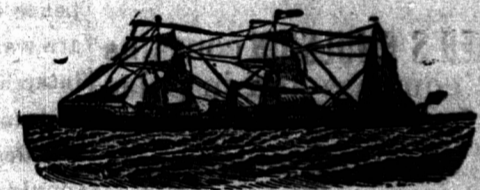
