### INKERMAN IS SCORCHED

(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) At 10.30 this morning fire broke out at Inkerman, the beautiful summer house owned by George E. Hughes, druggist, Charlottetown. A still alarm was rung in and promptly answered by the firemen who arrived there about eleven o'clock.

The fire, which started from rubbish which was being burned, rapidly spread and the large barn was soon a seething mass of flames as it contained a quantity of straw, hay and farming implements all of which were destroyed.

Much difficulty was experienced in trying to save the beautiful residence owing to the scarcity of water but the excellent work done by the firemen conquered the fire and it was saved although badly scorched at the back. The loss will be between five and six hundred dollars with no insurance.

### ADDRESSED FARMERS

Mr. Elliott of Galt, Ont, visited New Glasgow on Thursday afternoon, the fourth, and delivered a very interesting address to a large number of farmers on cultivation and rotation of crops and soil culture. He complimented the farmers on their well cultivated farms, but exhorted them to sow more clover as an up builder of the soil and to extinguish all noxious weeds which are making headway in neglected parts of the province. After the lecture was completed he was taken out to an enclosure which contained many fine horses and cattle. John Houston exhibited a beautiful Clydesdale gelding which was much admired. Ed. Rollings a fine mare with a Hackney foal, and Wm. Moffatt, a beautiful Hackney foal.

Mr. Elliott scored the various horses in their class and pointed out where defects could exist. It was an object lesson long to be remembered. In the cattle class, Adam Brown showed an excellent yearling Holstein bull purchased by the Northern Institute. He was considered almost perfect. A very excellent Holstein cow shown by Walter Buntain demonstrated what good breeding and feed can accomplish. Good milk cows were also shown by Adam Brown and W. H. Stevenson.

This was the first district show ever taken place in this section, and the good results, derived, from it guarantees an even more successful one next year.
