—**BRIDGE WORK**—The Bridge at Ross's Corner, North Bedoue, is undergoing repairs, having been for some time dangerous on the approaches having rotted away. The detour is being made via the Freetown Road to Abijah Burn's blacksmith shop, and from thence to Bedoue over the Dunk River Bridge. Travelers will note the great improvement which has been made on the Dunk River hill. This hill was very narrow and steep. On hearing that the traffic was to be diverted over this hill during the time the Ross Corner Bridge was up, the Representative of the District, Mr. Heath Strong, M. L. A. took the matter of the widening of the road on the hill up with the Department of Public Works, with the result that the high bank was considerably cut away and the hill levelled, some what and gravelled, and a fence placed along the dangerous side of the curve. The work is highly creditable to the Road Superintendent, Mr. John J. Frizzell, under whose direction the work was done. Ross's Bridge will be open for traffic in about ten days.—S.

—**NEW WEIGH SCALES**—The old weigh scales at Messrs R. T. Holman's, Summerside, which have been in use for over sixty years, are being replaced by a new set. The old ones were a pair of Fairbanks scales and for many years in the early days at Summerside, were the only ones available. The new ones are to be ten ton motor truck scales and have been purchased from the Canadian Scale Company, Toronto. The concrete base for the scale will have to be considerably enlarged. The work is being done as rapidly as possible.—S.

—**RAISE 500 BIRDS** we require four acres of land. Run chicks on plot 1, row 2 with sow pig, plant plot 3 with a root crop, sow pig 4 alfalfa or clover, and a nurse crop of oats. The 12x12 brooder house is run out on to the plot which is to carry chickens during the current year, and the requisite water fountains and dry mash hoppers are placed around wherever suitable. Continue No. 2 mash, keeping the grain feed as low as possible, and keep the birds supplied with clean water. There is a great deal to be gained by this raising of chickens, as it develops them in a way which stands them in good stead during the strenuous months ahead. From the poultryman's point of view, not only does he gain by the increased vitality of his flock, but the physical features of the birds, and also improved in their advantage. The large quantity of food consumed has the effect, already mentioned in connection with bran, of enlarging the intestines, and thus increasing assimilative capacity. Also, the exercise taken on range develops a good body, opening out the frame of the bird and giving a large internal cavity in which all the organs can develop. The birds should be moved into the laying house on or about the first of October, and as they are sure to lose considerable weight as a result of pinning over the top of their liberty it will be necessary to feed them up during the three weeks previous to the move. Early in September begin to increase the grain ration, and continue till the birds are getting all the grain they can eat. When they are moved at the end of the month they will withstand without any ill effects. A little consideration which helps materially in getting the pullets settled down quickly in the laying house, is to have the laying house dry mash hoppers and drinking troughs taken out on the range during the three weeks preparatory to the move.

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Prof. Shaw To Make Survey In Maritimes

TORONTO, July 6.—(CP)—W.J. Dunlop, chairman of the committee on adult education announced tonight the committee planned a detailed survey of adult education work in the various provinces. Plans for the survey were made at the committee's meeting at the University of Montreal this week. Professor L.W. Shaw will make the survey in the Maritimes and Alphonse Deslites and Eric Muncester will accomplish the work in Quebec. Drummond Wren has been selected for the task in Ontario and E.A. Corbett and Donald Cameron for Alberta and British Columbia. Selections for these to undertake the work in Manitoba and Saskatchewan have not been made, Mr. Dunlop said. It was decided, Mr. Dunlop said, to take steps to incorporate a Canadian association of adult education.

—**MORE ABOUT MONEY**—Since the great crash of 1929, I have read a great many articles on "Money," in which I take a more or less academic interest. Like Omar Khayyam, I

—**ABOUT AND ABOUT**—But evermore came out by the same door as in I went.

—**A STORY** from Guernsey, however, will bear repeating, though there are points in it which, I feel, need further elucidation. That island, as the Channel Islands, near the coast of France, but not belonging to Britain; the inhabitants are of mixed race, and combine the practical genius of the Norman with the imagination and enthusiasm of the Gaul. If the reader is at all curious about the customs and history of this remote people, let him read "The Tollers of the Sea," a classic romance by Victor Hugo, which gives a realistic picture of the island and its folk, and, believe me, it is a good story.

—**IN 1813**, when the Napoleonic wars had reduced Europe to poverty, the Guernsey Islanders "began to consider the use of interest-free money in circulation. Quite naturally the private banks fought this innovation, and after some years of altercation it was agreed that not more than \$200,000 of interest-free money should be put into circulation annually. So matters went till they needed more money. Rather than borrow, they then passed legislation to allow the use of not more than \$1,000,000 per year, of the "free money."

—**IN THE YEAR 1932**, the Guernsey folk used \$75,000 of their own interest-free money, and the total cost of handling this was less than \$2,500. That is, it costs something under 30 cents to give \$100 in use. The editor of the Guernsey Islander Evening Post points out that if this had been borrowed with bonds redeemable in thirty years with interest at \$6.60 per cent (which would be the usual charge) it would have cost the Islanders a little more than \$58,000 per year. Happy islanders! They deserve all their good luck!

—**I UNDERSTAND** that the editorial from which the above is extracted, has been reprinted and circulated in Britain, and has caused considerable public discussion. For various reasons I am not sanguine that the plan will be adopted there: John Bull is very "set" in his ways, and there are many interests, too.

—**THE ORDERS OF INSECTS**—The last of our true insects comes under the heading of the Ephemeroidea, so called because the adult fly was supposed to live for but a day. This is not quite true, but still the fragile creatures have a very brief span of existence in the image state, since their mouth-parts are aborted and they cannot feed.

—**LIKE THE DRAGON FLIES**, of whom they are "poor relations," the eggs are laid under water, and the larvae and nymphal stages are aquatic. In this state they are efficient scavengers, consuming any refuse vegetable in the water, and when it is known that one adult female will lay anything from 500 to 1000 eggs it will be seen that these humble insects do a very important work in our streams and lakes. Nor is this all; their countless numbers are a staple food of trout and other fresh water fish.

—**THE POPULAR NAME** for the adult is the "Mayfly," a favorite bait with trout fishermen. The Mayfly is a slender fly with a tapering body ending in two or three long setae or bristles; the legs are slender and the wings triangular and many-veined. A remarkable peculiarity is

that the mayflies moult (i.e., cast their skins) once, while in the adult stage. Mayflies dance in immense swarms over the water and amongst the trees, at certain periods of the year, and it is said that they are attracted by electric light in enormous numbers.

—**SCIENTISTS** have not troubled much with the mayflies, but one often finds them mentioned in prose and poetry, as being "creatures of the shortness of life." Kingsley, however, in his "Water-babies" treats them in a comic vein, even to the final moult of the adult fly; and if you haven't read about it yet, you ought to!

—**VAE VICITIS!**—When Rome was taken by the northern barbarians, the city fathers were ordered to pay a war indemnity of so much weight of gold. When the weights had been adjusted, the barbarian leader threw his heavy sword among them, with the cry "Vae Vicitis!—Woe to the Conquerer!"

—**VAE VICITIS**, the triumph of Might over Right. Recently, in this Canada of ours, two statesmen have openly commended the iniquitous "spoils system," have promised, if and when elected to put it into operation, and have approved of their political opponents having already done so. The system is unworthy of a great and free nation, and one can only think of these men as "glorying in their shame." In my day we had political sins in Britain, enough and to spare; but never this one. If an employee of the State did his work honestly, efficiently and courteously, he was safe in his position, let his political stripe be what it might. Only the controller of his Department, its figure-head and mouth piece in the Cabinet of the new government, was expected to be of the same "color" as the Prime Minister. Otherwise nothing was changed.

—**THE SPOILS SYSTEM** leads to corruption and inefficiency. The public in its own interest should sweep it away. It is even a nuisance to the member-elect, since, when he has "given the job" to a favorite, he leaves a soreness among the disappointed applicants. And probably the appointee is none too grateful—
