**THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST**

**Latest from Summerside and Prince County.**

DURING the past few days the water front has while the tide is in been almost lined with boys and girls fishing smelts which to all appearances are quite plentiful.

R. E. JOHNSON on the eve of his departure for Boston will be entertained at a supper given in his honor tonight at the Queen Hotel. Mr. Johnson who is one of the most popular young men of Summerside will be greatly missed in the community. The legal profession of which he is a member always held him in the highest esteem, and his departure from the P. E. I. bar will be generally felt with deep regret. In social circles too Mr. Johnson had endeared himself to hosts of friends and his valuable assistance at local entertainments as a musician, vocal and instrumental, has always been greatly appreciated. Many parting words will be said to-night and "Dick" will receive the best wishes of all for a future of prosperity.

THE lecture on "Here and there in Canada" by Rev. G. M. Campbell on Friday night was pronounced by critics who were present to be without any exceptions the best lecture ever given in Market Hall. Both his description of the country, its resources, its scenery and its illimitable possibilities, and its spirit of true patriotism that pervaded the discourse gave his hearers a grander and nobler conception of Canada than they ever had before. There was a good audience present. Rev. Neil McLaughlin was chairman and in a few remarks explained that as a lantern could not be secured the views would not be given but were substituted by a trio by Messrs. Stockford, L. J. and Wood. This was very nicely rendered. At the close of the lecture a vote of thanks was moved by Dr. McNeill seconded by Geo. E. Baker and supported by Sheriff Wright.

They were sitting by the fire having a quiet chat before retiring for the night in the lonely light house in Summerside harbor on Friday night last. We say quiet chat for the fact that there were only two of them, captain J. S. Allen, the keeper and his assistant Joseph Perry. It was just a quarter of ten o'clock. There were no noises to disturb the stillness of the hour, save a scarcely perceptible ripple of the waves against the breakwater. The night was dark, extremely so, and they perhaps held the lives of many a sailor in their hands by having their lamps trimmed and burning, but hark, a crash! Both jumped to their feet. "An explosion said the captain. "Joe run aloft quick, the lamp has exploded and the whole house will be burned. Be quick." Joe with the alertness of a grizzly climbing a pole ascended, followed slowly by the less nimble captain who was suffering slightly with a sore foot. Joe found the explosion quickly enough, one of the panes of glass which is fully one quarter inch thick was smashed. But his attention was soon drawn in another direction, where was struggling the almost lifeless body of a wild duck caught fast in a part of the lamp. The bird had apparently been disturbed in its slumbers and seeing the captain's ever brilliant light followed its rays, looking for morning. But it had no right trespassing on the peaceful inhabitants of our "Harbor Star," and they wrung its neck. "I tell you it was a fat one," said the captain to The Guardian reporter, his lips fairly smacking; and even the writer almost invited the boarders at the Strathcona. How the bird broke so thick a glass is puzzling; and this was not all; the green glass screen was also broken and the reflector was considerably dented from pieces of broken glass driven against it by the force of the crash. It is not known how many bones were broken as the carver was not an ornithologist; but the same bird has had many bones broken since that terrible night's experience.
