WELLMAN TO ATTEMPT TRIP ACROSS OCEAN

His Airship Shed in France Now Flooded—Thieves Shot for Robbing Homeless Ones—Railway Wrecks Caused by Floods—Heroic Rescue Work.

Special to The Guardian. PARIS, Jan. 31—Walter Wellman, who sailed from New York for Europe on Saturday, is arranging for a balloon flight across the Atlantic from New York to England or France in his Arctic airship.

A regular band of thieves has been at work in Charenton, but the soldiers have been shooting them at sight. The Zouaves killed two of the pillagers at Iry and two at Brié. The robbers have now transferred their operations to the devastated regions below Paris. Priests and nuns worked heroically, particularly at Alfortville, and rescued many of the inundated ones.

SAVIGNY, France, Jan. 31—Two collisions due to the demoralization of the railroad have occurred and 27 persons were injured. From midnight until noon the subsidence of the Seine averaged only a third of an inch an hour. The weather, however, continued favorable, with a rising barometer. The recession of the waters in some streets was noticeable during the forenoon.

CHILD MURDER IN NEW YORK

BERLIN PAPER DEPLORES TARIFF WAR WITH CANADA

BERLIN, Jan. 30—The Kolnische Zeitung, deeply deplores that Germany is carrying on a tariff war with Canada, which has resulted in a terrible decline in her exports to the Dominion and fears that Germany will not participate in the development of Canada, where her industrial products should find such an excellent market and trusts that relations between the countries will soon be normal.

GERMAN LOANS CAUSING ALARM

REVENUE SHOWS LESS BUOYANT

H. C. MCLEOD THROWS BOMB IN BANKING CIRCLES

Resigns Position Because He Is Not Satisfied With Present Conditions

HALIFAX, Jan. 29—In closing his address to the directors and shareholders of the Bank of Nova Scotia, on Wednesday, General Manager H. C. McLeod said in reference to his resignation: "Perhaps you are mentally inquiring why this change. The plain, simple truth is always best. I have contemplated retirement for some time, and at this visit I have urged the request so strongly that the board has acceded to my desires in the matter. There are absolutely no differences with the board. I count each member a warm personal friend and am sure these friendships will always endure. But I am not satisfied with the present conditions in Canada, and I am apprehensive of the results that will follow the period of fresh inflation of bank credit on which Canada has just entered. "For more than ten years I have striven to improve banking conditions, and while my agitation on the subject of cash reserves has been remedying a dangerous condition, that otherwise would have been disastrous in 1907, there is much yet to be accomplished. I was content to wait the bank act revision of 1900 to that of 1910, and to strive in the meantime. A well-informed banker has announced in words that cannot be mistaken, in regard to his authority to speak for the government, that there is not likely to be any important changes in the bank act. The next revision is beyond my horizon line. All the members of the Canadian Bankers' Association are opposed to changes that I have urged with

THE DISCOVERY OF MUCH COAL

New Find on Vancouver Island Rivals the Famous Dunsmuir Mine

THE OBJECT OF GOING AWAY WITH SECRETE MANAGEMENT

While I dislike controversy, if there were sufficient years to my credit in the ordinary course of business activity I might not shrink from a struggle that would involve the existence of the Canadian Bankers' Association, against which we worked, at the time of its incorporation, that the combination was against public policy. The dissolution of that body seems the fairest essential of banking reform. The controversy would involve differences of opinion with the minister of finance, for whom I entertain the highest esteem. I have earnestly and consistently sought to do my duty in the interests of Canadian finance. Eventually, the more important changes advocated will come. Secretive management must end. But I have not the patience to await these changes, nor the disposition to quietly tolerate a banking practice which has produced so much loss, and which looms a dark cloud on an otherwise fair outlook. Therefore I have asked the privilege of retirement. The future of the bank will remain a subject of great interest to me.

SITUATION IMPROVING IN PARIS.

PARIS, Jan. 31—While the most imminent peril is over, the fall of the Seine since yesterday morning measured only 15 1/2 inches. At this rate it will require a fortnight for the river to reach its normal level. Fortunately, tidings from flooded sections above Paris give hope of a more rapid subsidence. In the meantime, the situation in Paris and many places throughout the country shows little improvement indeed the ravages of the flood within the city has seemed actually to increase.
