Survey Of The Economic Position Of Canada At The Close Of 1931

IV Prices.

In addition, farmers, the most numerous class of our primary producers, have had to contend with drought and poor crops, as well as with low prices. Nevertheless, they are far from being alone in their difficulties. The producers of metals and of lumber have shared their hardships. While the average price of Manitoba Number One Northern wheat declined from 137.8 cents in December, 1929 to 53.6 cents in September, 1931, the average price of lead fell from 6.5 cents per pound in December, 1929, to 3.8 cents per pound in September, 1931. Between the same two periods the price of zinc fell from 6.0 cents to 3.707 cents and the price of electrolytic copper from 17.775 cents to 8.61 cents. Similarly, the average price of "pulp groundwood number one" has declined from \$30.67 per ton in January, 1930 to \$22.89 per ton in October, 1931.

The disproportion between the prices of raw or partly manufactured commodities and those of fully manufactured commodities is now diminishing, and this is one of the best proofs that business is re-establishing itself on a new level of prices. Between September and October of 1931, the index number of the prices of raw and partly manufactured commodities rose from 58.7 to 60.8, or by more than two full points, while the index number of the prices of fully or chiefly manufactured commodities rose only from 72.7 to 73.0. It is not improbable that in 1932 there will be a stabilization of commodity prices at a level of between 70 and 75 per cent of the 1926 prices. Already we have seen a rise of the general index number of wholesale prices from 70.0 in September, 1931 to 70.6 in November, 1931. This rise, which is also taking place in many other countries, is evidence that the period of panic is past and that the dawn of a new era is already brightening the eastern sky.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 8.—Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the British Exchequer, has challenged Senator William E. Borah to a debate on whether Soviet Russia should be recognized by capitalist governments.

Mr. Churchill, who is in the Bahamas recuperating from injuries received when struck by an automobile here last month, conveyed the challenge through his manager, Louis J. Alber of Cleveland. Mr. Alber stopped here en route to Washington, where he said he would discuss the challenge with Senator Borah tomorrow.

If the Senator from Idaho accepts, he will be expected to defend the policy of Great Britain in recognizing the present Russian government, while Mr. Churchill will defend the refusal of the United States to do so.
