Assures Success To Cathers Book

LONDON, Aug. 26—(CP)—As lovely and tragic as Juliet... Lucy Gayheart, beautifully expressed by her name, stands poised like youth itself on a hill, flying yet fixed in the mind. The reviewer of the Times Literary Supplement finds Miss Wills Gather's new book "Lucy Gayheart" written with full measure of her art. Miss Gathers describes her heroine as "a slight figure always in motion; dancing or skating, or walking swiftly with intense direction, like a bird flying home." The reviewer says the author "seems to be writing the lightest and slightest of records of a short life in an American village was goes to Chicago to study music; falls in love with a middle-aged singer, know a brief moment of deep content and then the pain of a separation that is final—but the impression left on her mind is not slight. "Haverford and its quite continuous life are presented in glimpses, merely as the background against which Lucy Gayheart's enchanting figure stands out. MORNING SESSION

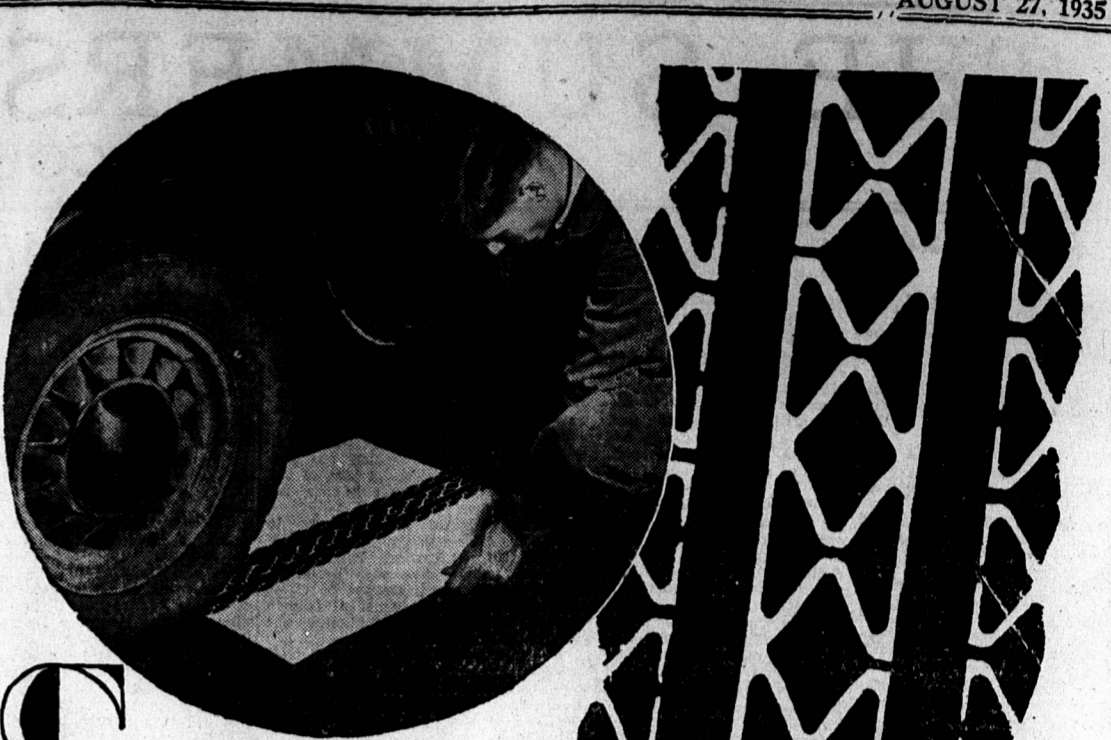

Microvision Lens To Aid Blind

NEW YORK, Aug. 26—(A.P.)—Twenty thousand children in schools for the blind may be returned soon to the world of vision through the aid of a newly created "microvision" lens. Dr. William Feinbloom, research fellow in optometry at Columbia University, announced today. Dr. Feinbloom, creator of the lens, told of the aid to vision at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Optometry. The miracle of restored, or partly restored, sight may become the experience not only of the sightless school children, but of 120,000 other blind persons in American institutions through availability of the new lens, Dr. Feinbloom said. The first lenses, Dr. Feinbloom said, will be made available to the school children. After a period of readjustment during which they will conform their mental processes to the added faculty of vision, they will be transferred to a school for those in the "twilight zone" and shortly will be able to lead the everyday lives of normal school children.
