WOMEN

AS THEY PASS

WOMAN'S CROWNING GLORY.

In Many Instances It May Be False—Where It Comes From.

The women of the United States, says a writer in the Detroit Free Press, "consume" one hundred tons of false hair every year. Possibly least important in the reckoning of what this may mean is the item of cost—\$350,000 to \$400,000.

And the dealers say that the women never indicate having a thought as to where this store hair comes from. They

Question not when or why. They buy to choose and buy, Fashion's 400.

Happily no hint of skeletons lurks in these human goods sold in America. No "dreadful" revelations lie back of the traffic; no chapters with hints of morgues or graveyards have part in the little tale of this "glory" of our women that is not their glory at all. To the contrary, the story has much old world romance about it—the best ambitions of simple and happy little maids.

If ever you lived in the country you remember the old peddler and how he used to trade the folk tinware and all sorts of notions for whatever the family had to exchange. In the same way, going constantly through the husbandry districts of Europe, there are peddlers with stocks of various kinds of finery that they trade to the peasant girls for "clips" from their hair. It is a distinct business and these peddlers are skilled judges. The peasant girls have much and fine hair—"dense heads of it," as one witty dealer put it. The field and mountain lassies over there go bare-headed most of the time—one of the secrets of their abundant "topknots." Another secret of it is that continually while resting the fingers of these peasant girls are busy "cutting" their hair, and, oddly, as it may sound to the city-bred girl, at the end of trading it for "pretties."

To constantly keep a rich head of hair to trade from is one of the great

est cares of young peasantry from earliest girlhood. But to trade for merely pretty articles of the trinket order is only one of the ambitions toward which the hair is cared for by these simple folk. Providing the necessities for their wedding time by the culture and sale of their hair is the main ambition urged in the earliest teachings of the peasant girl.

At no one time do they ever part with their entire growth of hair. They permit the expert to take only a certain number of clips at a time. The results, therefore, not always noticeable, and never really disfiguring.

All of the immense quantities of hats thus gathered—for these clipping tradesmen are constantly at work—is sold in Paris, world center for hair-working. There it is sorted, graded, classed and treated for the markets of the world. Half of the hundred tons sent direct from Paris to America every year is in the "raw" state, or exactly as it comes from the heads of the peasant girls. The other half arrives made up into collures, frizzes, etc., and pays a duty of 20 per cent.

What this peasant hair costs the Paris dealers is not known. The average price of both kinds to American dealers runs about \$3 a pound, and is retailed for about \$16 a pound. Considering that the greater part, if not all of it, must be handled and kept for a considerable time before being sold, there is a long way from 100 per cent profit in it, as might be thought from the figures given above.

Secretly an ounce of "domestic" or American hair is bought by the dealer, "Combing" the dealers say, do not pay for the buying at any price, as they are principally short and often dead hair. When asked whether it was possible to tell the length of time hair had been cut, a principal importer answered negatively. "It is utterly impossible," said he, "to tell at all, by examining hair, how long it has been cut from the head. The most luxuriant growth imaginable will after being separated from the scalp, if constantly exposed to the atmosphere and light, become ruined in a few months."

For this reason the hair merchant keeps his stock carefully wrapped in all cloth or oil paper and always away from the air and light. "If carefully and constantly so kept," added the dealer, "detached hair should hold its original natural brilliancy and softness for two years or longer."
