MR. WILLIAM A. CASEY  
There passed away in Amherst on July 26th, William A. Casey at the advanced age of eighty one years, son of Daniel Echibeth Casey, Esq. and Rosaline Chappell. He is survived by two daughters, Emma Casey of Calgary and Mrs. Russell Mills of Milo, Alberta, also one sister, Mrs. Walter P. Doull, of Charlottetown, who was at his bedside several days before he slept peacefully away. His ancestor, Thomas Casey, who was one of the heirs to the Irish throne, with his wife Sarah Owen, in 1638 left Ireland, on account of constant fighting and settled in Rhode Island, U. S. A., where the family remained until 1783, coming to Halifax at the time of the American Rebellion, where his lands were confiscated on account of his loyalty to the British Crown.  
He was a man of superior intellect, a keen Liberal Politician and a loyal friend. His whole life was spent in Bale Verie on part of lands granted to Jabez Chappell in 1763. His great grandfather, Liffey Chappell, son of Jabez, also received the Royal Grant of Fort Monkton from George the third.  
He was buried from the Episcopal Church at Bale Verie, where service was held, and laid to rest in the family plot in the Episcopal Cemetery.

ANGLO-EGYPTIAN TREATY PROGRESSES  
CAIRO, Egypt, July 31.—The newspapers Al Asram said today it had learned from officials in contact with Premier Mohammed Pasha Mahmoud that events in London were "progressing satisfactorily." miss your present advisers at the earliest possible moment and call upon Mr. J. T. M. Anderson to form a new Government.  
"In witness whereof we have set our hands this Third day of July A. D., 1929."

The course pursued by Premier Gardiner of Saskatchewan says the Moncton Times is in marked contrast with that of Premier Baldwin of Great Britain, who resigned immediately when his government failed to secure a majority of the members elect and advised his Majesty to send for Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, as the head of the largest group, to form a new government, although Mr. MacDonald did not have a clear majority over other groups combined. Good reasons are given in the Saskatchewan opposition memorial for the dismissal of the Gardiner Government as necessary in the public interest. But possibly it is as well in some ways that the Lieutenant Governor refused. Dismissal of the Government would have aroused a certain amount of sympathy for a had outfit and to be kicked out under the circumstances when the Legislature meets will add ignominy to condemnation by the electorate.

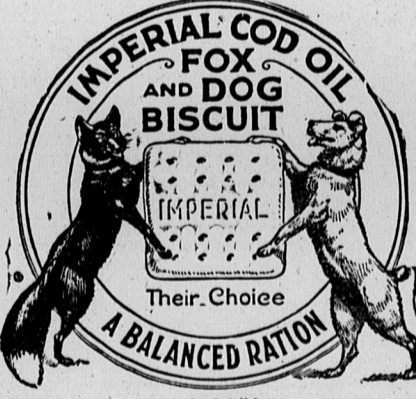
