OYSTER BUSINESS.—Mr. J. K. Ross, the president of the Belmont Oyster Fisheries, Ltd., whose beds are located at Cape Malpeque and at Curtain Island, P. E. I., has just returned to the city from the West where he had been superintending the operations on the company's beds. This company, the oyster beds of which extend over three hundred acres on which they have been planting oysters, has made excellent progress this year, and is one of the most conservatively managed oyster-growing concerns in Malpeque Bay.

SEED GROWERS MEETING.—Professor Theodore Ross and Mr. Garnet LeLachur left Saturday morning for Summerside where they will attend a meeting of the Banner Oat Club and farmers interested in growing of good seed. Mr. LeLachur, who represents the seed branch of this province, proposes to lay before this meeting schemes for enlarging and making more effective the work of this club. He proposes to give this body of farmers Dominion significance and to have their seed recognized all over Canada, through the Seed Growers' Association.

HANDSOME VIEWS.—Notwithstanding the bad weather on Saturday many pedestrians paused to enjoy the splendid photographic views displayed in B. E. & Weeks window on Sunnyside, the work of that well known camera enthusiastic Mr. W. S. Louson, whose charming pictures have given pleasure to so many in this city and Province. This time Louson has selected his views from beauty spots in P. E. I., to be forwarded to the C. P. R., offices at Toronto, for use by them in advertising this Province. So that citizens can see them before being shipped. They will be on exhibition again today.

GYMNASIUM CLASSES.—A start has been made with the annual gymnasium classes of the Young Men's Christian Association. During all the present week the classes were held, being divided according to the age of the participants. As the weather out-of-doors is still fine, on the whole, the attendance has not been very good. Yesterday's rain all day, however, resulted in an increase of the attendance. The work of the gymnasium is being directed by Mr. L. McMillan, the new Physical Director of the Association. The classes that have been held thus far, have been for the boys and youths, but the men's classes will be commenced this week.

ANOTHER ONE.—Yet another fox company has been formed, the application for its incorporation by Letters Patent appearing in the Royal Gazette published on Saturday. The name of the new concern is "The Consolidated Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd.," and it has behind it one of the most successful fox ranchers in this island, Mr. Frank F. Tuplin, of Summerside. In capitalization, it will be one of the largest companies operating in this island; its proposed capital is \$500,000, divided into 3,000 shares of the value of \$100 each, and its chief place of business is to be at Summerside. The names, addresses and callings of the applicants for incorporation are as follows:—Frank F. Tuplin, of Summerside, fox rancher; Richard K. Johnston, of Boston, councillor-at-law; John J. Gallant, of Mont Carmel, lobster packer; Neil McQuarrie, of Summerside, barrister at law; Angus A. McLellan, of Summerside, physician; Aubie E. Arsenault, of Summerside, barrister at law; Arthur C. Rogers, of Summerside, commercial traveller; Bannerman W. Tanton, of Summerside, barrister at law; Percy W. Turner, of O'Leary, Merchant; H. H. Ross, of Ottawa, veterinary surgeon; R. L. Hewson, of Amherst, N. S., merchant. Of these Messrs. Tuplin, McQuarrie, Turner, Arsenault, Johnston, Gallant and Ross are nominated as the first or provincial directors.

OFF FOR AMHERST.—Among those leaving Charlottetown this morning to attend the spiritual and missionary conference, to be held in Amherst, from Oct. 6 to 9th will be Rev. Mr. Marshall, Rev. Young, Tryon, and many others from different parts of the Province.

DUNGANNON, Oct. 2.—Sir Edward Carson carried the war yesterday into the enemy's country, reviewing 1,200 volunteers in this busy town in a constituency returning a nationalist, none other than John Redmond's son William Archer Redmond. A sharp division was shown in the market place where the gaps between streaming Union Jacks were ominous and also to sullen faces of some spectators. Dungannon is regarded as the most prosperous of the smaller towns in the north of Ireland with several mills and splendid agricultural conditions, which were revived in the last five years by Earl Ranfurly, former governor of New Zealand. The chairman was F. E. Smith. He attacked the Asquith cabinet and declared it meant anarchy.

GOOD BUSINESS.—It is not alone in the fox industry that the business of the island is booming. Messrs. Jenkins and Lantz, of Charlottetown, poultryers and manufacturers of canned goods, report a greater demand than they can supply. To a Guardian representative they stated, "We cannot get enough stuff locally to fill our orders." From the western provinces, especially from Calgary and Regina, they have received more orders for canned chicken and canned blueberries than they can supply, and this in spite of the fact that prices have advanced considerably above what they were last year. "This shows," said a representative of the firm, "that the people in the West want the best thing, and are willing to pay the highest prices." The firm are preparing for shipment to the West this fall two car-loads of canned chicken and canned blueberries, a car-load of each; the total value of this shipment being about \$20,000, representing in bulk 1,200 cases of canned chicken, and 1,000 cases of canned blueberries. The latter goods are ready for shipment, and will be sent off within the next few days, while the other articles will be shipped in a few weeks' time. Despite the extent of these shipments which represent the full capacity of the firm's output of the produce they have been able to obtain, they have orders from Sydney, Quebec and Vancouver that they cannot fill, merely because they cannot get the required quantities of the raw goods.

KILLED FIER SIX CHILDREN! MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., October 4.—Mrs. Ida Leckwold, 32 years old was arrested last night charged with murdering two of her children. According to the police the woman has not only confessed to killing the two of which she is accused, but four others as well. Her husband Ole Leckwold, also was arrested but later released, the officers being convinced that he was ignorant of the manner in which his children had met their death. The officers say the woman acknowledged administering quantities of a liquor fypison, but now she succeeded in getting the children to swallow it she would not tell. The first victim died in 1905 and the last in July, 1913. Leckwold declares that all six of the children died under almost identical circumstances. The family physician, who treated the last two children, says that he was surprised when he found them dead, but believed that death had come from natural causes, and made the death certificates accordingly. He ascribed cholera morbus as the cause of death in each instance. \$15,000,000 GUARANTEE FOR ALL-RED LINE OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—The establishment of a new fast line of steamers connecting Canada and Europe and operating between Cape St. Charles on the eastern coast of Quebec and Galway in Ireland, is involved in the scheme of the All Red Steamship company for which promoters are now in Ottawa seeking financial assistance. It is intimated that a bond guarantee of between ten and fifteen million dollars is sought. A company was incorporated in 1911 under the name of the All Red line, and meanwhile its organization has been perfected up to the point of arranging for new steamers of 15 knot capacity. A provisional contract with Swan and Hunter has been entered into for the construction of the boats. The land end of the project involves the building of a railway from Quebec or Lake St. John easterly to Cape St. Charles and a charter is already in existence. It is urged in support of the proposal that the distance between the two ports is but sixteen hundred miles and that it can be covered with but two nights at sea. It is understood also that Macenzie and Mann, who own railway charters in eastern Quebec have been interested in it. The matter is being laid before the government by the promoters but has not been dealt with officially as yet.
