Castilloux Outpoints Marquart In 10-round Bout For Light Title

TORONTO, April 30 (CP)—(CP)—Earning from behind in the closing rounds Dave Castilloux eliminated a doubt of his claim to the Canadian lightweight title here tonight when he outpointed Billy Marquart, of Winnipeg, in 10 rounds. There were no knockdowns in the non-titling bout.

Weighing 133 pounds, three pounds lighter than Marquart, the Montreal boy had his opponent on the verge of a knock-out in the eighth round as he pumped his fists and jets to the head. Marquart, named by the ferocity of the French Canadian's attack was unable to defend himself as he leaned against the ropes.

Castilloux gained the unanimous

decision of referee Jackie Johnson and two judges in defeating his most dangerous challenger. He not only proved his superiority in Canadian circles but strengthened his stand among the world's best lightweights.

Significantly behind on points as the eighth round started, Castilloux opened cautiously but finished with a terrific offensive. Opening a cut below Marquart's right eye with a left hook, he followed with a flurry of punches that had the Winnipeg battler groggy at the bell.

The champion held the edge in six rounds, the second, fourth, fifth and sixth, going to Marquart, the Winnipeg boy had Castilloux in trouble in the fifth when he drove a right to the Montrealer's stomach. As the round closed Castilloux stopped a left hook and suffered a slight cut on his left eye lid.

Browns Beat Yanks; 2 Hit Performance

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—The plague of porters that has kept the world champion New York Yankees in quarantine this spring broke out again today with a two-hit pitching performance by young Emil Bidwill of St. Louis Browns and gave the Westerners a 2-1 American Baseball League victory.

It was the first start of the season for the 25-year-old recruit from San Antonio in the Texas League.

Red Ruffing held the Browns to five safeties in rebuttal.

In Boston, Chicago White Sox started in where they left off last season by combining three Red Sox pitchers for 12 hits and a 9-4 victory. The last time the clubs met, the Sox swept a three-game series.

"Tex" Carleton Enters No-hit Hall Of Fame As Dodgers Down Reds

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—Carleton, a righthander who served terms with St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs and got into one world series with each, was sold to the Dodgers during the winter by Milwaukee of the American Association after winning only 11 and losing nine games last year.

He refused to get unsettled by three errors his teammates committed in the early innings and in the last five frames set the league champions down in order.

At Pittsburgh, Philadelphia's A. T. Pittsburgh, Philadelphia's rookies had a field day at the expense of the slumping Pirates, taking a 6-2 victory after chasing the Sox's hurler Bobby Klinger in the third inning. It was the fourth straight setback for Pittsburgh.

Laird Watt, Montreal, Canada's top-ranking tennis star in 1939 was in Charlottetown yesterday. Watt said he did not bring his tennis gear with him as he believed the courts here would not be ready for play so early in the season. An official of the Charlottetown Tennis Club, however, said the courts should be ready for play by the end of the week.

At present, Watt holds the P.E.I. open championship in men's singles, and with Ken Farmer, a fellow Montrealer, holds the men's doubles title. With Mrs. H. L. Roper of Halifax, he holds the mixed doubles championship of the Province.

Bimelech Is Red Hot For Derby Winner

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 30 (AP)—If there were any lingering doubts that Bimelech is the "red hot" horse in Saturday's Kentucky Derby—a well as potentially the greatest horse since Man O'War—they were deeply buried in the track at Churchill Downs today.

Bimelech not only waited in with the Derby Trial Stake, flying away from seven other candidates for Saturday's classic, but he ran most of the others right out of the Derby, and may have ruined one or two for keeps.

Colonel E. R. Bradley's bid for a fifth derby victory came down the stretch easily with the rest of the field spread out behind him. He finished 2 1-2 lengths in front and it could have been 22-2, for Jackie Freddie Smith didn't let him all the way out at any time.

It was his eighth straight victory in a two-year racing career that never has seen defeat. It probably was as easy a triumph as his eye had, despite the fact that the rest of the field was made up of gallopers who were supposed to face him Saturday in the mile and a quarter run for the roses. They were supposed to, that is, until they tried the trick today.

Dangers Of Wartime Gossip Is Stressed

OTTAWA, April 30 (CP)—The Department of National Defence has started a general nation-wide campaign to educate Canadians in the danger of gossip about naval, military and air force matters during wartime.

Notices appeared today in public buildings in Toronto carrying such warnings. They are similar to those posted at leading airports, in military and air force centers during the war and are the first efforts to carry the warning message to civilians at inland points.

The object is to prevent the circulation of information which might be picked up by enemy agents and related to Germany. While the bulk of information an enemy agent might pick up from casual conversations among Canadians probably would be harmless, there is always the possibility that some item useful to the enemy thus might be relayed.

Bears Lose To Red Wings

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—Newark Bears, ended their first home stand today by losing a 4-2 decision to Rochester Red Wings and dropping one game below a 500 record in nine International Baseball League starts.

The Bears combated Mike Ryba, veteran righthander, for 10 hits but they were well-distributed and he encountered a minimum of trouble chalking up his second win of the year.

Following for Newark, allowed only seven scattered hits but had shaky support and two of Rochester's four runs were unearned.

In Jersey City, the homesters made a clean sweep of their series with Buffalo and registered their sixth straight victory, defeating the "Reds" in the fourth and final game of a home-stand in which the Little Giants took eight out of nine games.

Syracuse Montreal Royals romped to a 12-1 victory over Syracuse Chiefs in the closing game of the home stand. It was a long "red out" affair in which 26 hits and five errors added to a half-hour interruption because of a wind and rainstorm.

Few War Names For Big Derby

NEW YORK, April 28—Few horses nominated for the 1940 Kentucky Derby at Louisville May 4 have names with a "militaristic" ring.

Of the 126 Derby nominees this year, only four have names that are associated with war terms. They are Gail to Colors, Battery, Carrier Pigeon, and Flight Command, the latter two both top-notch candidates.

Only once in 65 years has the Derby been won by a thoroughbred with a true "belligerent" moniker—War Admiral in 1937—and his name is largely a reflection of his famous sire's—Man O'War.

Several horses with "fighting" names, such as Sharpshooter, for example, have finished in the money in past Derbies.

If the present European conflict is used to any extent as a source for names, it probably will be two years before the influence is noted since the 1940 crop of foals won't be 3-year-olds until 1942.

GALENTO FIGHT POSTPONED

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—At the request of Tony Galento, his 15-round fight with Max Baer at Jersey City's Roosevelt Stadium was postponed to July 2 by promoter Mike Jacobs today. Originally, it was scheduled for May 28.

Galeto asked for the postponement because of the death last week of his manager, Mike Jacobs.

LONDON, April 30 (CP Cable)—Marcel Bousquet's French-bred Djebel and the Earl of Derby's Lighthouse II tonight were made joint favorites at 11 to 4 to win tomorrow's two thousand guineas, first of the season's three-year-old classics.

The next choice was the Maharajah of Kolhapur's Tant Mieux at 7 to 1, followed by Fair West, 9 to 1; Stardust, 10 to 9; Prince Tetra, 10 to 8; Hippus, 20 to 1; Ridley, Epilobium, and Nut de Nove, 25 to 1; Turkhan and Through the Mist, 33 to 1; Bladen, Bon Accord and El Morocco, 40 to 1; Balzaroch, Lucius, Congratulations and R-mulus, 50 to 1, and Saguenay, 66 to 1.

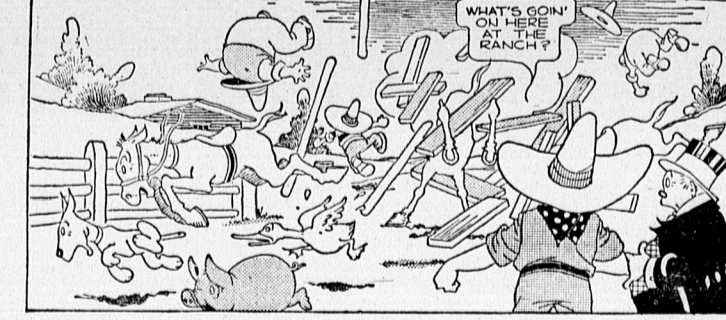

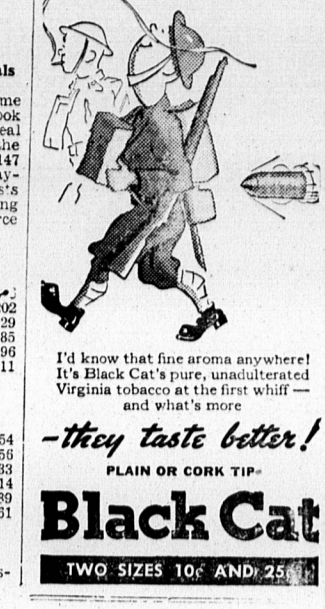
