CANADIENS AND BRUINS SCORELESS TIE

Canadiens Clinch 3rd Place In Canadian Section, Ousting N. Y. Americans.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 19.—Boston's bruising Bruins, who a few weeks ago battered Montreal Canadiens into a 10-0 defeat, could do no better than a scoreless overtime tie against the same team here Saturday night. The single point from the draw made it a certainty that the bright-hued livery of the "Flying Frenchmen" would add color to the National Hockey League play-offs. The Canadiens went into the battle against Boston with a three point lead over New York Americans in the race for third-place play-off position in the Canadian section. Now the Flying Frenchmen have added a point to give them two full games over the Amerks who must win both their remaining games to tie the Lalonde men. In the event of a tie the Canadiens would get the call because of their better showing in the "win" column on the season's work. Nevertheless, it was dull hockey that 11,000 fans watched here Saturday night. Both teams covered up so closely at every turn that there were few thrills. The crowd clapped rhythmically in boredom as long checking duels at centre ice slowed the play.
