## NORTH ATTLEBORO, MASS.

### Formal Act on.

A meeting of the school committee was held last evening and the appointment of James W. Brehaut, as superintendent of schools to succeed W. C. Hobbs, who resigned was formally made. Already several applications for the position of sub-master at the high school have been received and a person will be appointed this week. Mr. Brehaut will enter upon his new duties in September 1.

James W. Brehaut, is the son of Thomas S. Brehaut, of Murray Harbor South P. E. I. Entered P. W. College, Jan. 1889. Secured second class license in June of the same year. Taught in White Sands, King's County for a year. Entered P. W. College fall of 1882, to study for first class. Passed at head of list winning the Marquis of Lorne's silver medal for scholarship and bronze medal for excellence in teaching. Taught in Guersey Cove, King's Co., for three months; returned to P. W. College and remained till April 1884, when he taught in Bradalbane School for ten weeks. Became Principal of the York school in 1885, remaining there till June 1887. Entered Dalhousie College, Halifax, in Sept. 1887, winning a Munro Junior exhibition value \$400. Led class for first two years and in Sept. 1889, won a Senior Munro exhibition value \$400. Graduated in 1891, with first rank honors in classics. Entered the Senior Class of Harvard in Sept. 1891. Graduated in June 1892. Became Vice Principal of the High School at Westbury, R. I., in Sept. Held position for two years until he was elected Principal of the North Attleboro High School in 1894, the position which he now holds.

The note quoted above refers to his election as Superintendent of schools of the town of North Attleboro, in addition to his studies as Principal of the High School.
