ordinary use. To have a motor service on that road in its present condition would be unthinkable.

At this stage the dinner adjournment was taken.

Before the House rose, however, Mr. Kichham asked the leader of the Government when the House was likely to be prorogued, and Hon. Mr. Mathieson replied that he had hoped that they might be able to get through on the following day, but on going into the amount of work that was yet to be done, he had come to the conclusion that it was quite impossible to get through the work by then; but they would try to do by Wednesday next week.

Mr. KICKHAM, upon this explanation, then asked and obtained the House's permission to be absent from the House; a similar concession being obtained by Mr. A. P. Prowse.

AFTERNOON'S SESSION

On the resumption at 3.15 p. m. the Bill entitled an Act to provide for the Use of Motor Trucks on the Public Highways was reported, considered in committee and was agreed to and ordered to a third reading.

The House again resolved itself into committee (Chairman, Mr. T. W. McDonald) to continue consideration of a Bill to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Trust Company.

The PREMIER: I think we should take a little more notice of this Bill than the House is inclined to give it. In the history of this province we have developed a very large population, which we sent abroad to our own great loss. We have also developed capital in very large amounts which we have sent abroad to be used by other places in developing their industries, while our own industries were neglected. I might cite as an illustration the case of life insurance companies. We have been paying for a generation or more annual premiums. We have been sending these to the large centres of population in the United States and Canada, and the accumulations of capital that accrue at those points in consequence were dealt with by trust companies and applied to the development of industries all the time we were depriving ourselves of the effect which arises from the accumulation and proper direction of capital. That is only one illustration. The same thing is true if you apply it to a hundred other lines. Our money is being taken from us; the banks take it. They pay us 3 per cent and send it off to the West and elsewhere and they get from 6 to 8 per cent. If they lend to our own people they lend at more than double the amount borrowed. Now, I am going to take one concrete instance, which I think will illustrate pretty well the effect of this unfortunate diversion of capital from our own centres to the centres elsewhere. It was only a year ago that a man came into my office; he thought that I was engaged in the law business as formerly. He applied for a loan of \$300; he had a farm that I knew of worth from three to four thousand dollars. He said: "I can't do anything for you, but you can surely raise the loan?" He said: "I have been in Charlottetown for two days and have gone everywhere and I simply can't get the money at any price." Now, I leave that case to stand by itself. We have at the same time in this province a very large number of people who have accumulated wealth, and they with their wealth are liable to leave us unless we interest and concern them in the industries of our province. What we desire above all things, first of all, is this, that a man who wishes to borrow money on security of his farm shall be able to come to Charlottetown or Summerside, or whatever the centre of business may be, and come with the equal certainty of being able to get money of an amount for which his real estate is security, as if he were buying any commodity in the store. We don't wish that our farmers borrowing money should feel themselves under any obligation to any person. If they borrow money and put their real estate in security for it they should feel as free in relation to the lending power as the buyer of any commodity in the store does when he buys and pays for things; and we should have it on such a basis that our people should be able, upon giving proper security, to obtain money at a proper rate of interest. I know by experience that there are a number of gentlemen in this House who know that it has been getting exceedingly difficult for years years to get loans on mortgage security at fair rates of interest. It is well known that many of those who made loans have been calling them in, and

ing payment, harassing to a degree rather unusual the people that borrowed. All we desire in respect of this bill, and the thing most desired, is that the men who have money to lend shall put that money into the Trust Association for lending purposes, and that those who borrow shall be able to borrow at rates more certain and more moderate than the rates which now prevail. It is something like what I spoke of this morning, where fishermen sell fish on the shore at a cent and a half a pound and we buy it at 8. The fishermen should get twice the price and we pay less; and so it is with borrowers and lenders. Instead of lenders receiving only 3 per cent, the borrowers should receive more and the lenders should pay less. Now, that I take it is the object of this present act. Above all things, we need in this province a trust association in which the ablest of our men, our strongest financiers, shall concern themselves by supervising the industries which the funds placed at its disposal. In the history of every city, not only in Canada but all over the world, you will find that success in industrial development has been based upon credit wisely given and well maintained by trust associations controlled by the ablest financiers of the place. We have in Prince Edward Island men who have money and who have the ability to contribute funds towards a trust association and wisely to guide the development of industries based upon credit and support that such an association can give, so that while we are dealing with this act as we might deal with an ordinary act, I would like to call the attention of the House to the fact that we are opening one of the doors to progress and development on a larger scale than we have heretofore done.

THE WEATHER

THE TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Special to the Guardian.)

TOKOOTO, April 23.—Fresh to strong northwesterly winds, fair and quite cool.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was quite cool and rather disagreeable. There was gusty winds and occasional snow falls.

The temperature yesterday was somewhat lower than for any day during the past week. At nine a. m. it was 33 above, which was the lowest recorded during the day, and at nine a. m. it was 35 above. The highest reached was 39 above. On the previous night the lowest was 28 above.

The tide will be high this morning at 9:37 and tomorrow at 10:08; it will be high tonight at 10 and tomorrow at 10:45.

The sun sets this evening at 6:59 and tomorrow at 7; it rises tomorrow morning at 4:56 and Saturday at 4:55.

The moon sets this afternoon at 5:35.

The last quarter of the moon was on Friday, April 17 at 3:52 a. m. There will be a new moon on Saturday, April 25th at 7:22 a. m.

The length of today will be fourteen hours and one minute.

THE FOX TAX ACT

The PREMIER in explaining the purpose of the Bill, said: The object of the amendments proposed is to enable the Government to acquire full and specific information from the different companies engaged in the ranching and breeding business in this province; and the general intention is to use that power for the purpose of acquiring such information as can be used most advantageously to the interests of this great and rapidly growing business.

We have frequently received enquiries which our means of access to information does not enable us to meet to the extent that we think is necessary. I don't know how much the people who are engaged in the industry of breeding foxes appreciate what the Government has been doing on behalf of that industry; I do not think they have adequate means of knowing how much has been done. In the first place, through the direct agency of the Provincial Government, an agent was appointed by the Dominion Government whose duty it was to see that the principal business of this Island obtained proper publicity. That was through the direct action of the Provincial Government; but the amount of work that has been done through that agency, although very large is small in comparison with the total amount of publicity work that the Provincial Government has done. Enquiries from all parts of the continent of America and from many parts of Europe are pouring in continuously. Requests are always being made for information of the most authentic character, official where it can be given; and the Government has spared no pains, no time and no expense in providing that information to the full. I do not think that any information has been furnished the world in relation to the fox business which has had more direct effect, which has been regarded as more authentic and substantial, than what has been given on the basis of the sworn testimony of the owners of the foxes produced in the year 1913, the number and the value, for the purpose of taxation. Wherever that statement has come forth it has carried with it an authenticity and conviction that has been worth more in the development of the fox business many times over than the actual cost of taxation, which the province has imposed. The idea of the present act is to enlarge the field of official enquiry in order that the quantity of official information may be increased for the purpose of circulation over the world wherever an interest is taken in the business. I think that we have had some criticism in this House as to the expenditure on account of administration of justice. I would say that that the fox industry introduced new perils to property that called for a very large amount of increased expenditure in order to prevent such valuable property from being subject to undue risks. It involved more than that. Hon. Mr. Arsenault and myself interviewed the Minister of Justice and succeeded in having the criminal law amended so that the breaking into a fox or fur-producing ranch is placed upon the same basis as the breaking into a man's house, warehouse or store. Prior to that and until that amendment was made, all that could be done to a man that broke into a ranch, if you could not convict him of theft, would be to treat him as if he had committed an offence. The criminal law of Canada has, through our agency, been amended so that the breaking into an enclosure where any kind of wild animals are kept in captivity for the purpose of breeding fur-producing stock, is on the same basis as burglary. We often receive from boards of trade in different parts of the Empire and constituted authorities in the United States a series of categorical statements asking this and that, and our returns made for the purpose of taxation do not give us all the information that those questions call for. What the Government desires in the present act is an authority to send to ranchers circulars calling for such information in addition to what the tax act authorizes as will enable them to furnish to the best advantage the material which those outside parties interested call for.

The Bill was reported agreed to and ordered to a third reading.
