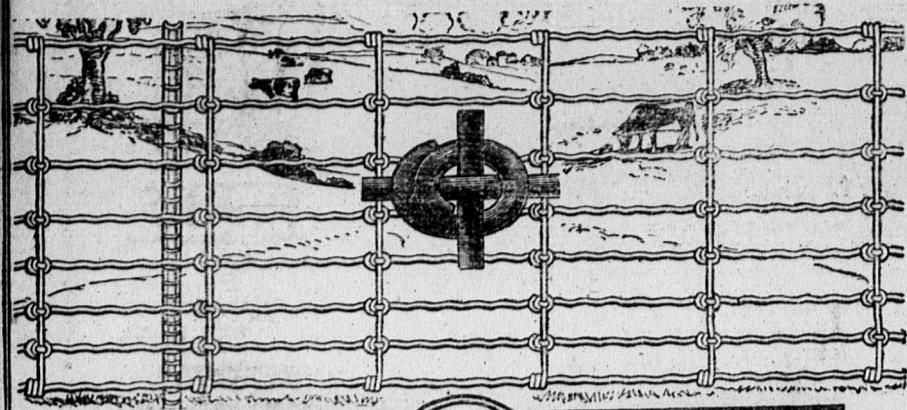

## BUDGET DEBATE CONTINUED

### BY MR. M. F. McDONALD

(Continued from page 1)  
"My hon. friend claims that the western roads were neglected, but that the roads in Kings County had been attended to all right. He admits that money was spent on the upkeep of the roads in that part of the Province, and I can assure him, Mr. Speaker, that money is being spent on the roads in Kings County for the same purpose as it is being spent on the roads in Queens and Prince Counties—namely, for the purpose of giving the farmers of the Province good roads on which to haul their products, and on which they and others can travel with comfort. We do not claim that the roads are as good as they are from being "boulevards." But we know that the patrol system inaugurated by the present Government has done much to improve the condition. And it will become the Leader of the Opposition, or the member from O'Leary (Mr. Dennis) or any of these gentlemen who were supporters of the late Liberal Government that spent absolutely nothing on the maintenance of our roads, to criticize the road policy of the present administration. (Applause.) They allowed that Western Road on which thousands of dollars had been wasted to go to ruin, without even an attempt at repair. The policy of this Government is good. We realize that it is more important to the farmers to have good roads now than at any time in the past.

Among the many ridiculous statements of our friends in Opposition probably none can be more so than the statement that the present Government increased taxation. The Leader of the Opposition even went so far as to say that we increased taxes on farm lands, and for proof of that assertion he gave special instances today paying more taxes on their land. He wishes the people to believe that that is the general condition. But if the hon. gentleman had been honest in this matter he would tell the House that he knew also of farmers who are paying less today than they did under the Bell Government. We all know that the value of farm land, like the value of all other real estate, changes as the years go by. One farmer may be more prosperous than another, consequently the value of his farm will increase. Another may meet with misfortune and the value of his farm may decrease, and he would be paying less taxes today. But my hon. friend knows perfectly well that the Government has not increased the rate of taxes on farm lands.  
In proof of his statement, Mr. McDonald showed that in 1922 the farmers of the province paid \$92,380 in taxes on farm lands, while last year they paid \$89,050, or \$3,330 less last year than during the last year of the Bell Government. This was proof positive that the land tax has not been increased. (Applause.)  
Now that there has been secured

an increased subsidy from Ottawa this Government is reducing taxes on farm lands twenty per cent, as well as other taxes bearing on other classes in the province. This, as every one knows, is only in fulfillment of the promises made to the people.

The statement of the Leader of the Opposition that two lawyers are running the affairs of the county is not correct, Mr. McDonald said. But even if it were, it would not be a very serious charge against the Government, since the people generally are well satisfied with the manner in which the business of the province is being conducted. The Leader of the Opposition seems to have a very poor opinion of the members of his own profession, when he criticizes the Minister of Public Works for being a lawyer, "a young fellow just out of school." That gentleman has been out of school long enough to have had an experience that many Leary (Mr. Dennis) would be proud to have, and his experience has evidently well qualified him to perform the high and important duties to which he has been called. One would think the Leader of the Opposition would welcome the opportunity of crediting the Government with having placed a returned solicitor in that position. But he is a lawyer, and a Conservative, and therefore he must be criticized. Objection has also been taken to the Premier holding the nominal position of head of the Department of Agriculture for a few months in order to save the country the expense of a bye-election. The Leader of the Opposition claims the Premier has been away from the farm so long that he has forgotten all he ever knew about agriculture. That statement, like many of the statements of the Opposition members, is so exaggerated that it will not be credited by the people, who know that the department is being satisfactorily administered.

The Opposition members are extremely hard to please. In fact, it is probable that the Government will never do anything to please them. The only things that please them are the things they do themselves, but unfortunately the actions of these gentlemen in the past did not please the electors; consequently we see them where they are today.  
The object of the Government has been to administer affairs in the best possible manner. An indication of its success is shown in the fact that the majority of our people are well satisfied with the administration. The Premier in his Budget address has given a very full statement of how the business of the country has been conducted. Other speakers who followed have given details of the work done and have outlined the policy the Government will pursue in the future. Mr. McDonald felt it unnecessary to take up further time of the House, as any remarks he had to make would be largely a repetition of what has already been stated by members on this side of the House. (Applause.)
