PREPARATIONS FOR THE KING'S CORONATION GO ON

Though Not Strong His Majesty Wishes to Avoid Any Further Postponement.

INEFFICIENT TELEGRAPH OPERATORS IN LONDON

Messages Must Be Sent Slowly—Strict Press Censorship enforced in Russia, Every Independent Journal Being Suppressed by New Minister of the Interior

INEFFICIENT OPERATORS.
LONDON, Aug. 2.—(Special)—The inefficiency of the post office telegraph service is confessed in a circular of instructions stating that a considerable percentage of the three thousand operators employed in the Central office, London are inexperienced and inefficient and directing operators in outside offices to adapt their speed to the capacity of the receivers.

SOME APPREHENSION FELT.
It is generally conceded by those in close touch with the Court [that His Majesty is not likely to be in a fit state for the Coronation at the end of next week; but it is also the frankly expressed opinion that serious risks must be taken since he cannot reconcile himself to a second postponement.

THE COMING CORONATION.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE SHOWS INCREASING INTEREST

A Delightful Excursion of the Members Amid Scenes of Historic Note—Lectures by Miss Van Horne—The Old Owen Homestead.

The days of the session pass very rapidly and with increasing interest. The ministers of the several churches of St. Stephen made special and appreciative references to the School and the work in which it is engaged during their Sunday services.
On Monday was the first all day excursion which was to Campobello and Eastport. Leaving the public wharf by the steamer Viking at 8:30 o'clock a.m., the party proceeded down the St. Croix River, one of the very beautiful sails with which this part of the Province abounds. Every spot along the St. Croix, formerly Schoodic River, is historical. Mr. James Vroom, of St. Stephen, has made a special study of this local history. He pointed out all the places of historical interest and also related many an Indian legend.

In your own city with its 12,000 inhabitants. The Island of Campobello was in the early days granted to Admiral Owen. The old Owen homestead has been renovated and is now The Owen Hotel. Many relics of the Owen family are in the library. From Campobello we proceeded to Eastport, Maine, and visited Old Fort Sullivan, the most easterly fort in the United States and a reminder of the struggles of the British and Americans for the possession of what was at that time disputed territory. During the day the old boundary dispute was fought over again in the minds of more than one of the excursionists. From Eastport we returned to St. Stephen by a course entirely different from that taken in the sail down the river, passing new points of interest. This excursion was the gift of the town of St. Stephen to the School, and when the School meets in Charlottetown as we trust it will in the near future, the inhabitants thereof must be prepared to do themselves like credit in the way of entertaining their visitors.

Monday evening after the return from the excursion a most interesting lecture was delivered by Miss Van Horne, sister of Sir William Van Horne, her subject being some mushrooms found in Canada. Miss Van Horne as well as her brother Sir William has made the mushroom a special study. She described only such as she had herself found being upwards of seventy varieties which are edible and according to the description given, most of them are a great delicacy. This lecture was profusely illustrated by lantern slides made from original drawings and photographs. The school grows in numbers and interest every day, the enrollment having now reached 250. St. Stephen, N. B., July 29, 1902.
