(Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, July 23 (CP) - It's true that hard work makes you happy but it's no wonder Mrs. Clara Hall sings most of the time. She has been busy filling shells for the past four and a half months, seven days a week, that she has averaged only four hours' sleep out of every 24. "There's no fun like work," said this 33-year-old munitions factory worker and mother of three children when told she had been picked by the supply ministry as the "worker of the week." This is her usual day in her Yorkville factory. She gets up at 3:45 a.m. - breakfast and tidying the home; 4:15 a.m. - leaves for work; 6 a.m. - starts on her job; 2 p.m. - working shift ends; 5:40 p.m. - arrives back home. Reaching home late in the day Mrs. Hall has her shopping to do before getting dinner. Then there is housework, mending and getting the children to bed before she retires herself about 11 p.m.

Slaves, nurses, maids at Guy's Hospital in London are now bare leg now. With stockings hard to get the ban on bare legs in the hospital has been lifted.

The experiment of "pairing" two women to share factory and house work, carried out in one government factory, is announced a success. The labor ministry says the two part-time women can do more work than one full-time worker.

Under the pairing system two women work on one machine as a single unit, one on the morning and one on the afternoon shift. The women from occupied France are reaching home in a matter of at least one week. They join the fighting French forces. They come by fishing boat, by canoe, by small boat they have built themselves and by plane.
