FORUM, Montreal, Feb. 17.—Toronto Maple Leafs extended their lead in the National Hockey League's Canadian division to eight points tonight when Regis (Pep) Kelly shot a goal in the last five minutes to defeat Montreal Maroons 2-1.

The little Irish wingman dropped Maroons a step nearer elimination from a playoff chance when he came from nowhere to golf the puck home as Nick Metz's shot bounded from goalie Bill Beveridge's chest.

The size of the crowd, around 4,000 fans, headed out the play. Unlike usual Maroon-Leaf battles, there wasn't a penalty until the last period.

POMPTON LAKES, N.J., Feb. 17.—Believe it or not, Jack Tebo, an earnest young man from Fairview, Ala., who "likes to go a ways in the fight business," is enjoying the suicidal job of sparring with Joe Louis.

"Jabbing Jack"—as they call him in the Pompton-ripped camp by Pompton Lake where the heavy-weight champion is training for next week's title defense against Nello Manfrotto—figures he is learning many fine points in swapping lethal larrups with Louis.

The 22-year-old Canadian gave the champ a rip-roaring workout. There were many rugged exchanges, in which the Albertan held his own behind a booming right fist.

Late in the second round, Tebo tied off on the dusky champion's feet. His right flew about a foot and landed with such force fight-writers at the ringside were showered with the perspiration of the puncher jarred from Louis' face.

Louis' eyes betrayed the fact he had been hurt and, perhaps, angered. He flew at his annoyer with both hands pumping and several clouds bounced off the Canadian's head and body.
