ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

Percy McMahon, I. C. R. telegraph despatcher left today for his home in Prince Edward Island. On his return he will be accompanied by Mrs. McMahon who has been spending the winter months at her home on the Island.—Moncton Transcript.

MARTIN WEST of this city has received the following letter from his son who has spent the past winter in Inisfall, N. W. T. Dear Father—I received your very welcome letter a few days ago and was glad to hear that you were all well. It appears you have had a very severe winter on the Island. Here we only had two months of winter weather February and March, with just enough snow for good sleighing and very fine weather. Last fall we had no rain. December was a little cool, but January was like summer with cattle grazing everywhere. During February and March the wheeling and sleighing were both good, as there were no snowstorms to block the roads. In fact we have not had a wind storm since I came here about a year ago. Most of the snow fell at night and the thermometer registered from 5 to 30 below zero but it was so calm we did not feel it. Cattle and horses lived outside all winter. I saw 20 steers, rising three years old, that were fed out all winter in a barnyard on prairie hay, cut straw crushed grain mixed and water only. These cattle were almost as fat as the Easter cattle in Prince Edward Island which have been fed for two years. They weighed from 1300 to 1500 lbs live weight and sold for 4 cts per lb. When April came in the snow left at once, on the 5th farmers were working the land and by the 12th a lot of grain was sown. The weather is still fine and we have had no rain since last summer.

F. G. SPENCER, who is conducting Nordica's western tour, is evidently pursued by smiling fortune. Under his arrangement, Nordica is to sing in Brandon and Winnipeg, and was also to have given recitals in Grand Forks and Fargo, North Dakota and Duluth (Minn.) The latter dates have been sold by him, however, to the millionaire conductor, Duss, of New York, at a big figure, and Nordica will travel from Winnipeg direct to New York. American of Sunday last says: "Madame Nordica will be the soloist to share the glory with Duss and his Metropolitan Opera House orchestra at the opening of the second summer season in the Madison Square Garden building, May 22. This will be the only appearance of Madame Nordica in this city for at least two years. She is on a tour of the west and Canada, and to make Madison Square Garden she must break her route and come direct to New York. Madame Nordica objected to riding 3,000 miles and singing the next evening. But London Charlton, Duss' manager, bought out the contracts of two western cities and made other financial concessions which brought the prima donna here. Conductor Duss is superintending the manufacture of a great glass sounding board to make the music easily heard in the remotest corners of the garden." (Mr. Spencer is well known in Charlottetown where he has brought a number of first rate attractions).
