DESPATCHING C. P. R. TRAINS BY TELEPHONE

Train in Distress Can Telephone Headquarters From Any Point—C. P. R. Has More Miles Under This Service Than Any Other Railway

ST. JOHN, July 26—The Atlantic division of the C. P. R., from St. John to Vancorbo, is now equipped with the appliances used for telephone train dispatching, in accordance with the up-to-date methods in use over 3,955 miles of Canadian Pacific tracks, on practically every section in the dominion with the exception of that between Fort William and Winnipeg, which is double railled, and therefore does not need the new system.

The new service of train dispatching marks a further step in the development of railroading in Canada for the C. P. R., and in the eastern division it will be under control of Frank J. Mahon, Atlantic superintendent for the C. P. R. Telegraph Co. St. John will be used as a controlling or transmitting station, the office being fitted in the C. P. R. building in King street, adjoining that already in use as a telegraph office.

Yesterday the system was given a trial, and worked very satisfactorily, while today the use of the new service was resorted to as a matter not of experiment, but of reality. Those in charge interested in the dispatching were well satisfied with the result of their efforts. The system worked splendidly, but of course allowances must be made in consideration of its being really the first day and, better results are looked for.

Times' reporter was shown through the office where the telephone and switch board were installed, and had a brief chat with the operator at McAdam, who, although talking in ordinary tones, seemed to be fairly shouting, so distinctly audible are voices even in low sound over this "phone arrangement. This is said to be a matter for study in connection with the telephone dispatching, namely to regulate the voice so that it may sound easily and gently to the operators at either end.

The operator in the local controlling station will have charge of a switchboard on which are affixed the names of each station along the line, each with its distinctive call, and connection, and simply by the turning of a dimmutive crank handle, the channel is opened for study in connection with the telephone dispatching of the trains. Two telephone instruments have been installed in the local office, which enable two persons to hear what is being said from the distant station at the same time.

The instruments are adjusted in somewhat the same manner as are those used by the "hello girls" at central, but they differ slightly in design. They are supposed to be worn by the operator throughout the period of labor, until he is relieved and are so constructed that they prevent the entrance of other sound than what is desired to be heard over the wires, that is, conversations, noise, or the clicking of telegraph keys, are not heard to such an extent that they prohibit conversation being carried on.

A distinct and advantageous feature of the new system is that all trains running over the line are equipped with connecting outfits, and can at any time open connection with the main station, by attaching to the wires running by the track, a pole-like instrument which immediately makes its presence known in the transmitting station. Connection may thus be opened at any place along the line, simply by the stopping of the train, and adjusting the instrument, and through a sort of "buzzer" which sounds in the ears of the controlling operator may take the initiative in the conversation. It is at once apparent that this connecting of trains of all kinds is of distinct and telling advantage in a time of dismemberment, wreck or other similar occasion.

On the first trial today the new system of dispatching worked satisfactorily, and as time goes on, it is expected that a change to the old system of telegraph would not be desired. It was feared at first by some that the installation of the newer and more up-to-date methods would perhaps result in the lessening of the number of telegraph operators employed on the railroads, but this is not the case, as the dispatcher who attends the "phone" is required to have a knowledge of telegraph in order to be permanently employed as such.

The C. P. R. now leads all other railroads in America in the number of miles covered in this telephone dispatching service, and in some districts the system is not of recent installation, but has been in commission for some time, and given such satisfaction as warrants the extension throughout the dominion. From Montreal to Newport the system has been in use for three years, while with the exception of the Atlantic division other sections have had it for a year. Since such commendable results have been obtained elsewhere it is the expectation of the local officials, and of Mr. Mahon particularly, that the same will be experienced in New Brunswick.

A GREAT FISH STORY.

BAYONNE, N. J., July 22—Alfred Miller, of the police department, went off duty at 5 o'clock yesterday. In the evening he turned up at his home with an account of his experiences in the few hours which had intervened. He had gone out fishing in his 35-ft. motor boat, and had cruised down the ocean coast until he was off Seabright.

He had noticed a turmoil in the water to seaward. The disturbance came nearer until he could see that it was caused by a school of porpoises. Then he saw that the porpoises were trying frantically to get away from something, and a minute later it became evident that the something was a school of sharks. The hunters and their quarry came on until they surrounded Miller's boat, and the water about the boat was red with the blood of the porpoises.

The motor boat rocked as the fighting mass charged about it, and then, as several of the sharks and their victims seemed to hit the side of the boat at about the same time, it keeled over. Miller crawled upon the upturned bottom of the boat and got his shoes off. Before he could get further undressed the boat sank.

Miller found himself in blood-stained water, a mile and a half from shore, in the midst of the massacre. He is a strong swimmer and struck out for shore. He had to kick porpoises out of the way and push them out of the way with his arms, so thickly were they herded in their flight. Then a good-sized shark came up to him, and Miller kicked at the fish with all his might. The shark turned and grabbed a porpoise instead.

The sharks, the policeman said, followed him, closing up and then dropping back again as he jabbed at them with hands and feet. He reached the shore pretty well exhausted, but otherwise unharmed, and got to a fishing house, where he was braced up until he was able to take a train home. Miller is 37. He wears a medal bought by a subscription raised by residents of Bayonne ten years ago, when he saved a seven-year-old boy from drowning in Newark Bay. The boy was in a rowboat alone well out in the bay and fell overboard.

Miller swam from shore, reaching the boy by diving. He has won several swimming races.

DARING GIRL SAVES NEGRO MAID'S LIFE

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 24—Pretting to shame a crowd of men who would not imperil their lives, Miss Daphne Armstrong, daughter of C. D. and Mrs. Armstrong, of West C. D. Street, New York, this afternoon effected one of the most daring rescues ever seen at Fairchild Beach. Louise Bunce, her colored maid, had gone in for a swim in front of the Armstrong Cottage, Cedar Villa. The maid was not an expert swimmer, and when out two hundred feet her courage gave out and she began to scream for help.

Miss Armstrong, who is an expert swimmer, had just put on her bathing suit when she heard the cries of her maid. She ran out of the house, and with a glance of scorn at the men on the beach, began to swim swiftly toward the drowning girl. By this time the maid had sunk and Miss Armstrong dove until she found the unconscious woman. The two were under water some time and the watchers on the shore feared that Miss Armstrong was a victim of the other's drowning struggles.

They finally arose to the surface, with Miss Armstrong clasping her

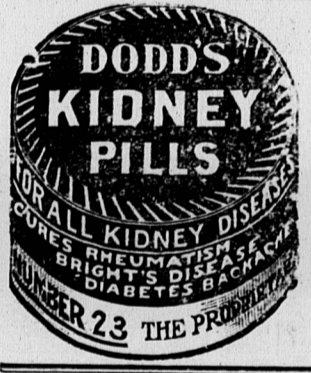
