"In this work for the deaf blind we are really blazing a trail in a new field in which very little has been done, but understandably, therefore we must go slowly and work on individual cases. The deaf blind are like other human beings; no two are alike. As far as the foundation has been able to verify cases, there are about 2,000 deaf blind in the United States. But I am glad to report that as far as we know, none resulted from the war."

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**Australia Fills Many Big Wartime Food Assignments**

**CANBERRA, Jan. 28 (CP)** — Victualing the last 12 months has been among the many important food orders by Australia. Although the fleet has now moved its base from Sydney to Hong-Kong, it will continue to be largely dependent upon food supplied by Australia for a long time to come.

During the last two years Australia has supplied the British Admiralty with \$60,000,000 worth of food, about two-thirds of which went to the Pacific Fleet. This was made up of large quantities of dairy products, meat, jams, canned and dried fruits, eggs, potatoes, canned vegetables, fats and cereals.

Throughout the Second Great War, Australian food, particularly meat and dairy products, played an important part in maintaining the morale of the British troops in the first three years. Australia sent Britain 1,800,000,000 pounds worth of food to the United States Pacific area.

**Aided By U. S.**

In return for diverting food for Britain to American forces in the Pacific, the U. S. government undertook to supply the community and amounts to Britain, thus saving valuable time and shipping.

Despite the feeding MacArthur's men, manpower difficulties, chronic shipping difficulties, and the long detour around the Cape and one of the worst droughts in the history of the country, Australia managed to send to the United Kingdom during the last three years of the war more than 2,000,000,000 pounds of food valued at approximately \$1,800,000,000.

During the last two calendar years Australia has sent nearly 4,000,000,000 pounds of food to the United Kingdom, to British forces, and other destinations nominated by the British ministry of food.

Present demands on Australia for food are higher than at any time during the war and the country's resources to the utmost. As well as being needed to maintain Australia's own cultural and service personnel, Australian food output is being drawn upon by the British services in India, Ceylon, Burma and Singapore, the British Admiralty, and the British ministry of food, people in the liberated area in the Pacific and by U. N. R. A.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**JAMES J. CONDON**

In the death of James J. Condon, passed away at the Charlottetown Hospital on December 6th, 1945, Georgetown lost one of its most popular and respected citizens. His surviving relatives and a great host of friends will undoubtedly miss him, and will recall with fond remembrance, as long as they live, his cheerful, jolly spirit; Irish wit and humor, and hearty laugh. He had an uncommonly fine disposition, and though he could be determined and resolute when he thought the occasion demanded, seemed abnormally friendly, and overcome any difficulty in his human relationships by a supreme tact and patience. He showed no trace of vanity or self-conceit, was charitable in his judgment of others, and was rarely known to utter a word of criticism against friend or foe. In the realm of useful activity, Mr. Condon was certainly a busy man. Owner of a general mercantile business and bus operator, he was also a member of the Southern Packing Co., a cooperative enterprise which he in association with several other labor fishermen formed some years ago. **Murdered Child's Parents Receive Human Ear By Mail**

**CHEAGO, Jan. 29 (AP)** — An other gruesome phase of the case of Suzanne Degnan, 6, kidnapped, was found in sewer catch basins, developed today when a human ear was received by mail at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. James E. Degnan.

Lieut. Philip Brizick, head of the Police Department, and the head of little Suzanne, which with the other parts of the body was found in sewer catch basins, had both ears and therefore the police were dismissing today's exhibit from the community and turning it over to Post Office inspectors.

Dozens of persons have been wrapped in tissue paper in a three by three-inch box, done up in brown wrapping paper with no markings on it other than the address. It was mailed in Chicago. He said policemen on duty at the Degnan home opened it and brought it to police headquarters.

The kidnapper left a \$20,000 ransom note but investigators determined that Suzanne had been killed, more than six hours before Mr. Degnan found the note. The investigators decided her body was cut in pieces in a basement laundry room in an apartment building within two blocks of her home.
