SHEFFIELD CAPTURES ENGLISH SOCCER TITLE

Wednesday Defeats West Bromwich Albion 4-2 Before Crowd Of 93,000

(C. P. Cable, By Guardian's Special Wire)
LONDON, April 26.—After a lapse of 28 years the historic English Cup again glitters in the trophy room of Sheffield Wednesday, one of England's famous soccer clubs.
Before a crowd of more than 93,000 in Wembley Stadium the Yorkshire team received the cup from the hands of the Prince of Wales Saturday following its 4-2 victory over West Bromwich Albion in one of the most thrilling finals in recent years.
Three times in its long career the Wednesday has been victorious in cup warfare. In 1898 Wolverhampton Wanderers were beaten 2-1 and in 1907 the Yorkshiremen defeated Everton by a similar score.

TORONTO TEAM TAKES LEAD IN HOOP SERIES

Broadview Y. M. C. A. Captures Opening Game of Intermediate Title Series 24-10.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 26.—Toronto Broadview Y. M. C. A. tonight held hopes of carrying the Canadian Intermediate Basketball title back to the Queen City after taking a 24-10 victory from Saint John Basketball Association Intermediate last night in the first of a two-game title series for the Dominion championship. The second match is to be played here tomorrow night.
Mayor J. W. Brittain made the opening face-off of the dull but clean game, featured by poor marksmanship on both sides. No score was produced until 11 minutes after the first ball was tossed up.
LEADS ATTACK
Bill Broadon, tall Toronto centreman, by his stellar work in the last few minutes of the match as he led play after play into Saint John territory and counted eight points, proved to be the outstanding player on the floor.
Little George Turner shone for Saint John. The cagey forward scored six points, getting squirming through Broadview defence, and was a constant threat while in Toronto area.
Saint John dominated the greater part of the first half showing cool combination work which kept the ball in centre court but gave the forwards few shots on the basket.
A long shot through the hoop by Martin, Broadview forward, exactly 11 minutes after the opening whistle sent Toronto into the lead and caused Saint John to change their tight style of play.
Captain Dave Samme scored a penalty shot after and put Toronto three points up but Saint John went on the score sheet at the 13 minute mark when George Turner, speedy forward, twisted in close and dropped the ball through the hoop.
INCREASE LEAD
With deep thrusting attacks Toronto increased their lead and St. John continued to open up in an effort to draw up on even terms.
Although they appeared tired and uneasy, Broadview players gained confidence as the match progressed and their combination plays became more clever.
Leading dangerous drives right up to the Saint John hoop, in the first half, Herb Moore, tall Toronto guard, was Broadview squad's most dangerous man. He counted four points, two of them on penalty shots.
A penalty shot and a goal by Samme, and goals by Stronach and Martin put Broadview on the long end of the 11-4 halftime score.
MARTIMERS DISORGANIZED
Turner and Corbett registered Saint John's four points. The Martimers attacks became disorganized in the final half of the match, and an almost impenetrable defence by Toronto guards forced them to resort to long shots.
Breaking down Saint John plays and leading countless rushes toward the enemy hoop, Bill Broadon, Toronto pivot, combined with Barney Stronach, clever forward, to add 13 points to Broadview's score before the final bell. Three of the points came from penalty shots.
Saint John fought desperately and sent swift plays into Toronto zone but they were unable to overcome the lead. The Association team counted six more points before the end of the match. Flueky, George Turner dropped in two goals, while Arlington Copp, rangy Saint John forward, scored the other.

VICTORIA HOOP TEAM STILL IN RUNNING

VICTORIA, April 26.—Victoria Blue Ribbons, seeking the men's senior basketball title of Canada, handed another job Saturday night to the confident Assumption College of Windsor crew by taking the third game of the five-game championship series 38-20.
Ribbons won the first game but Assumption came back to win the second. In such handy style that the Victoria quintet was just a little more apprehensive over their titular chances.
Last night's game was a fairly close affair for the first half which ended with the Victorians leading 16-10 but in the second half the Ribbons forged ahead to pile up a good lead.
In the third quarter Ribbons tossed in 10 points, twice as many as their opponents, then outscored the visitors 12 to 5 in the final period.
Windsor again held the honor of opening the scoring and counting the final points but in between failed to stave off the rushing tactics of the Ribbons as coach J. A. Barnwell sent his men charging into Windsor territory to carry the battle.
Doug Feden, the red-headed six-footer who holds down left guard for Ribbons, led his team to victory as he counted 19 of the 36 points.

One Hit Robs Schumacher Of Perfect Game As Giants Defeat Phillies 3-0

NEW YORK, April 26.—One single of a very scratchy variety spoiled Hal Schumacher's chance for a perfect game today as the big right hander hurled the Giants to a 3-0 victory over the Phillies at Polo Grounds to strengthen the club's hold on the National League lead.
Orville Jorgens, second of three Philly moundmen got the lone blow in the third inning. Schumacher got his glove in front of the hard hit ball and deflected it to Dick Bartell, who went across to the far side of second to take his third out.
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Behind the five-hit pitching of Bill Lee, Chicago Cubs bunched five singles in the ninth to win from the Reds 4-1 at Cincinnati.
The season's largest crowd—29,514 paid customers—watched Sammy Byrd make the Reds' lone score, a homer in the first, his third of the year.
The Dodgers were unable to hit in the pinches and were beaten 5-3 by Bob Smith and the Braves to lose the series at Ebbets Field, two games to one. With three hits Hogan led the 11-hit attack against Van Mungo.
Babe Ruth fanned twice, grounded out once and walked before he left the game in the seventh inning.
Cy Blanton, Pittsburgh prize rookie, engaged Dizzy Dean in a hurling duel and came out on top at St. Louis as the Pirates downed the world champion Cardinals 3-2 before a crowd of 12,000.
The young Dizzy recruit held St. Louis to eight scattered hits while his teammates landed on the best offerings of the "Great One" for 11 singles. The victory was Blanton's second in a row over the world champion Cardinals and Dizzy's second loss of the season.

ROYALS IN DOUBLE WIN

MONTREAL, April 26.—Montreal Royals scalped Syracuse Chiefs twice at Syracuse today before 6,000, taking the opener 4-4 and adding a 3-0 victory in the nightcap.

Merrill May's well placed single brought in the winning run in the last half of the 10th inning in the first game.

Washington Senators Win Series With Red Sox

Powell singled to center and Lary sacrificed. Kress, pinch hitting for Hadley, grounded to the Sox manager who again lost it and Blugee, running for Bolton, and Powell scored.
A home run by Earl Combs with the bases loaded gave New York Yankees a 4-5 victory over the Athletics at Philadelphia.
Bob Johnson notched four hits in a row, including two round trippers, to account for four of the A's runs. Five double plays featured the play.
