A meeting was held in the Legislative Library yesterday afternoon in connection with the proposal to form a branch of the Canadian Division of the Aerial League of the British Empire.

Those present included: Premier Matheson, Sir Charles Dalton, Hon. Murdoch McKeown, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. J. C. Colwell, the Honorable S. R. Jenkins, Judge Aeneas McDonald, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Mr. J. E. B. McCready, Mr. D. B. Stewart, Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, Mr. George J. Rogers, Mr. A. E. Morrison, Mr. A. W. Hyndman, Mr. Bruce Stewart, Mr. Harold Jenkins, Captain T. G. Taylor, Mr. John Anderson, Mr. H. Shaw, Mr. John Bradley, Mr. Oliver Craswell, Mr. Wm. L. Acorn, Mr. Reuben McDonald, Mr. J. R. Burnett, and Mr. J. J. Egan.

Mr. F. W. Hyndman explained that at a preliminary meeting he had been appointed acting president. He briefly explained the objects of the meeting.

Mr. A. A. McLean, M. P., read a communication from Mr. G. R. Lighthall, of Montreal, who told of the organization of the Aerial League in that city. The object it was explained, in this letter, was to encourage and stimulate the invention and manufacture of aerial craft and things appertaining thereto, disseminate knowledge and spread information about aerial navigation. Mr. McLean explained that while in Montreal recently he had met Mr. Lighthall and conversed with him about the matter. Mr. Lighthall said:

he was anxious to see a branch of the League formed in every province. Mr. McLean told him the formation of a company having for its object aerial transportation between this province and the mainland was contemplated. Mr. Lighthall recommended him to a certain gentleman who would give him further information as to construction and costs, of manufacturing a company and having a bill passed before the Legislature for the running of aeroplanes.

On motion of Mr. F. W. Hyndman it was decided to proceed with the election of officers for the Charlottetown Branch of the Aerial League.

The following were elected: President—Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Secretary—Mr. Oliver Craswell. An executive of five was elected as follows:

Messrs D. B. Stewart, A. A. McLean, M. P., C. H. B. Longworth, A. E. Morrison, and R. H. Jenkins.

Treasurer—Mr. G. W. Harrison. It was moved by Mr. A. E. Morrison, seconded by Mr. G. J. Rogers, that Sir Charles Dalton be vice-president for the Branch.

Carried unanimously. It was decided that the annual fee of the League be \$1.00.

A committee of three to draw up by-laws was appointed as follows: viz.—The president, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Mr. J. E. B. McCready, and Mr. A. A. McLean, M. P.

It was decided to immediately take steps to form a company. Messrs McCready, Taylor, F. W. Hyndman and Judge McDonald, were appointed a committee to organize a large committee, with a view to organizing an aerial company for the purpose of establishing aerial communication with the mainland.

The appointing committee was given power to add such names as they saw fit to the above list.

In the course of his remarks during the proceedings Mr. McLean stated that already a recruit for the air service from this province had volunteered. Mr. George M. Milford.

Mr. McCready nominated Mr. Craswell as secretary because he said he took a great interest in the work, was well posted on different matters connected with aerial navigation.

Mr. Hyndman said he had been in communication with the manufacturers of different machines and all had recommended the idea of starting a local company. Mr. Hyndman thought no Government would refuse a subsidy to the project.

After some further discussion the meeting adjourned to meet again at the call of the president.

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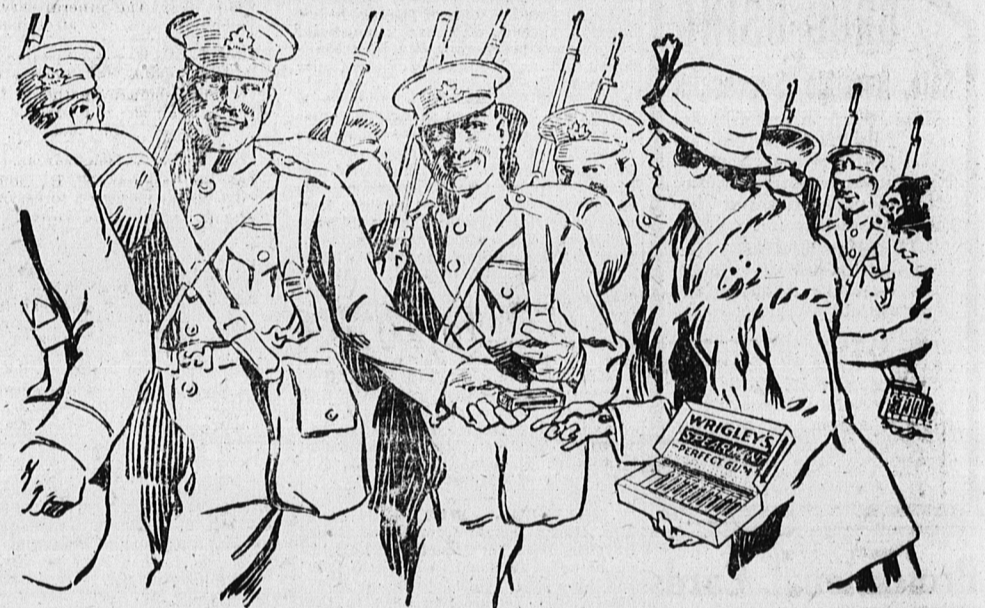
