YESTERDAY afternoon it was rumored that several cases of diphtheria had developed in the city during the past few days. A GUARDIAN representative immediately waited upon Dr. Johnson and learned that two cases developed on Wednesday and a third developed yesterday, in the home of Henry Fitzgerald, Sydney street. The doctor does not consider the disease of a pronounced type and it yields readily to treatment. The bye laws are being rigidly observed and the present outbreak is being handled in the best way possible by isolation and the use of the anti-toxine treatment. Dr. McLeod reports that he visited St. Dunstan's College on Tuesday last and found the three cases there convalescent and that the authorities of the institution are doing all possible to stamp out the disease. The students who came to the city have all returned to the college and the institution has been isolated from its surroundings.
