Receipts were 442 cattle, 469 calves, 302 hogs and 128 sheep and lambs including about 400 cattle and 100 hogs held over. There was a continuation of the heaviness experienced on Monday's cattle market and early sales today were practically nil. Calves were steady with yesterday's quotations. There were no calves of top quality. Medium good calves sold up to \$4.25 with medium kinds from \$3.75 up, and just plain calves around \$3.25. Common light drinkers were sold as low as \$2. Good lambs brought \$9 to \$10 with just fair kinds around \$8 and culls were slower sellers with sales as low as \$5. Sheep mostly \$2 to \$2.50. Hogs were unchanged. Bacon and butchers brought \$5.50 to \$6.65. Select hams drew \$1 per hog premium. Heavies, \$5 to \$5.15. Extra heavies \$4.50 to \$4.65 and lights \$3.50 to \$3.65. Sows were from \$3.50 to \$4.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, June 13—With trading quieter and sales volume comparatively light, the Montreal dairy and produce market held firm at yesterday's advances during today's trading. Dealers in butter and cheese are expected to be awaiting tomorrow's weekly auction when 1,100 boxes of butter and 800 boxes of cheese will be offered to the highest bidder. The general quotation for no 1 regraded butter in carlots or less was unchanged at 15 1/2 to 16 cents a pound. The egg market failed to record any change and graded receipts were light at 47 boxes. The egg market failed to record any change and graded shipments in carlots were 150 boxes of extras at 17 1/2 to 18 cents a dozen for extras, 14 1/2 cents for firsts and 12 1/2 cents for seconds. A total of 2,270 cases was offered for sale. Current Ontario colored cheese also held firm. At the close of the day's trading, selling for 11 1/2 cents a pound. Arrivals amounted to 575 boxes. 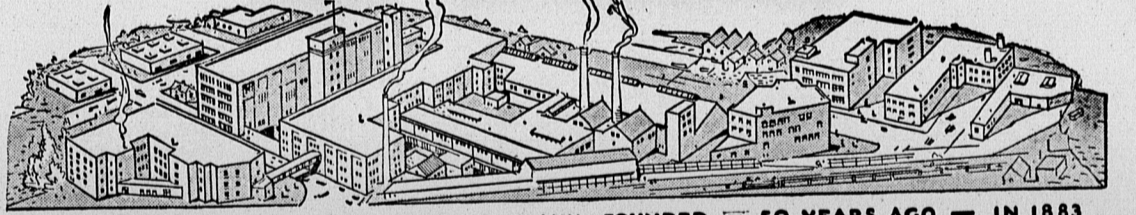
