The latest news, first of all.

James Rainne, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co., Sackville, has returned home after a short visit at Windsor, the guest of Isaac T. and Mrs. Saunders.

Miss Lillie Taylor Mill View, has arrived home from Boston to visit relatives and friends in this Province. She is now visiting Mrs. A. E. Ings, Mt. Herbert.

H. D. Munn, Vancouver, B. C., and Daniel Munn, Southampton, Ont., arrived last night to spend a day or two in Charlottetown before making other visits in this Province. They are registered at the Victoria.

The str Turret Bell is now lying along side the Marine Wharf, and is an object of much curiosity to citizens. On Sunday night crowds witnessed her arrival in port and many continued to visit and inspect the rescued vessel.

Miss Stella Murphy, graduate nurse of New York, arrived last night to spend her vacation at her home on the South Shore. She is a daughter of Thomas Murphy, and before going home is making a short stay with Mrs. L. B. McMillan, Prince Street.

Mrs. John Connolly, formerly of this City, now residing in Sydney, C. B. arrived last night by the str. Northumberland, accompanied by her young son and will spend some time in Charlottetown, the guest of Councillor and Mrs. Campbell, Richmond Street west.

There was the regular monthly meeting of the City School Board last night. The matters attended to were chiefly routine. The resignation of Miss E. J. Dorsey a teacher of Queen Square School was accepted and Miss Margaret Smith was appointed in her stead.

S. M. Wetmore, secretary of the S. P. C. A., St. John, last week took a hand in the care of Mrs. Phoebe Gallant, the woman from this province who was refused admission to the United States by the immigration officials and for some time had been cared for at the Grand Union by the proprietor, W. H. McQuade. Mr. Wetmore called at the hotel and at his request Detective Killen took Mrs. Gallant to the Almhouse, where she will remain unless word is received from her relatives. She is suffering intensely from rheumatism.

The remains of Stewart McTavish, so foully murdered at Cambridge, Mass., were lovingly laid to rest. In the family plot at St. John's Cemetery, Belfast on the 28th inst. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. D. McPhee assisted by Rev. Mr. McIlwain of Iowa. The exceptionally large concourse of people following the sad funeral procession showed the high esteem in which the deceased was held in his native land and the deep sympathy felt for the sorrow-stricken parents and relatives. The scene at the home when the sad message came was heart-rending, and one never to be forgotten. He who promises "to wipe all tears from our eyes" is graciously sustaining the broken-hearted parents and family by the sweet consolation of His grace and presence. Stewart was a young man of exemplary character and a general favorite. His untimely and cruel death has cast a deep gloom over the whole Province. The bereaved parents and relatives have the prayers and sincere sympathy of all.

William McKinnon, of Boston, who accompanied to this Province the body of Stewart McTavish, of Eldon, returned yesterday to Boston, after paying a visit to his brother D. L. McKinnon of Montague. Mr. McKinnon in discussing the tragic death of McTavish says that the Boston papers have the facts in the main, correct, although of course, the sensational element is very pronounced. The general opinion is that McTavish was drugged and robbed, and that on recovering consciousness he naturally made such a vigorous protest, being a strong active fellow, that violent measures were used against him. He had about \$50 in his possession when he went to the Richmond House, and there was no money on him when the body was found on the eventful Friday morning. Mr. McKinnon saw the remains about four hours after they were discovered. There was a bullet wound in the head, which was also frantically hacked with an axe. The Richmond House was generally patronized by teamsters and men of outdoor occupations. They were on the whole good hearted friendly fellows, though lacking society's polish. Some facts in connection with Mrs. Richmond's history have appeared in the papers. It is stated that she inherited a fortune of \$40,000, but that was several years ago, and it is said that she has gone through with that money, and was not very flush of late.
