OLYMPIC DIFFICULTIES

The Olympic games to be held at Los Angeles this summer are apt to be the most abbreviated and sparsely attended sports that have taken place in the recent years of their revival. The United States committee which is gathering money to transport athletes within the confines of its own country is experiencing great difficulty in getting the funds necessary.

And if the Americans are having trouble prospects for teams that have to travel the Atlantic procurer transportation and living expenses are decidedly slim. Money is not flowing particularly freely in the United States today. The stream there is lessened in comparison with that of a few years ago. The Yanks have not escaped the depression and a greater percentage of wealthy sportsmen and sporting organizations than just about the rest of the universe combined.

The intimation contained in recent dispatches that the United States team will probably be curtailed and athletes only entered in events that it will likely win means that some countries will, if they are forced to follow suit, be represented by a lone and solitary athlete.

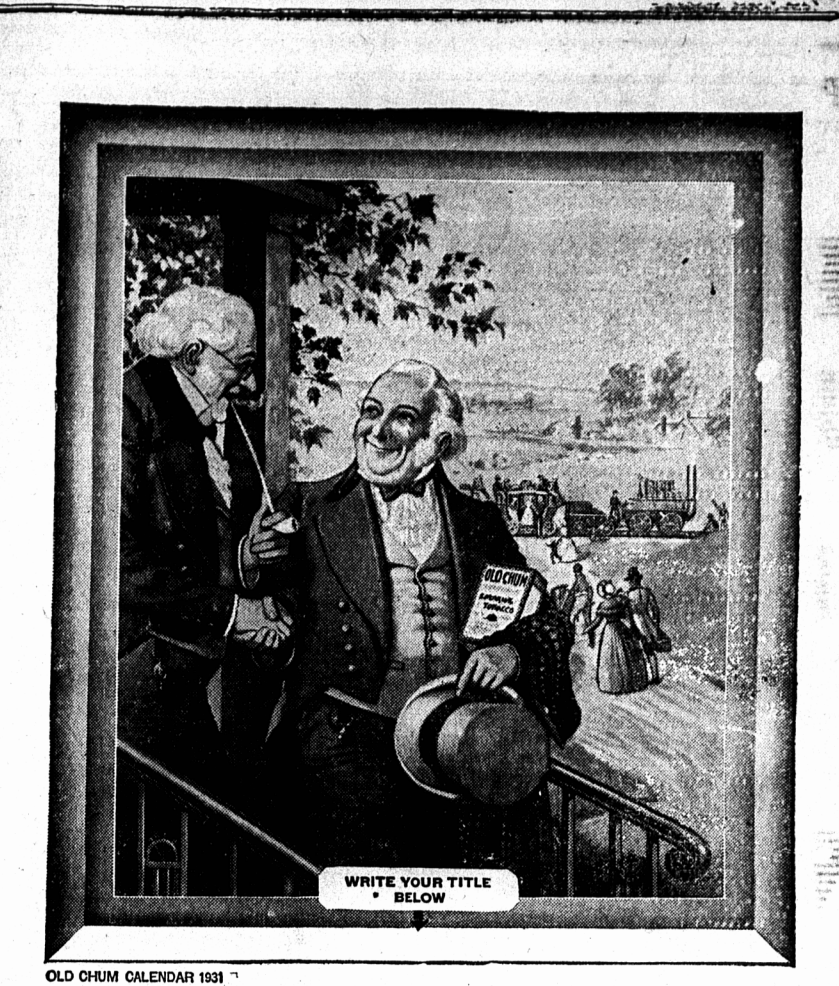
Trojans Lose To Winnipeg Hoopsters 35 - 19

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 5.—Winnipeg Trollers were champions of senior basketball in Canada to-night. Playing brilliantly against Saint John Trojans, the skillful Westerns accumulated in the first half a lead that Saint John could not overcome, despite desperate efforts on the part of the local team in the last period, and the final score was, Winnipeg 35, Saint John 19. The series was determined by the best two games out of three. Trollers gained 39 points against 37 for Trojans in the initial encounter Tuesday night.

New Glasgow

On January 4th, 1932 a meeting was held in St. Ignatius School, Mayfield to organize a debating club for that community. Although the attendance at this meeting was small the organization was carried out successfully. Zachariah Buote acted as chairman and Emmet Gallant as secretary. Jeremiah Peters was appointed President of the club, which was given the name of Mayfield debating club. A programme committee was appointed consisting of Henry Leclair, Florentin Gallant and Bertha Buote and they faithfully performed their duties in having well selected programmes prepared for every debate which were held weekly during the winter months. A subject committee was also appointed consisting of the following: Zachariah Buote, Jeremiah Peters, and Andrew Gallant. This committee always had a subject ready to be announced at every debate for the succeeding one, and judging by the very animated and lively discussions which took place we are led to the conclusion that this committee performed their work satisfactory to all concerned. A Treasurer was also appointed in the person of Alphonse Dolron who performed his rather difficult role in a very efficient manner. Byelaws were drawn up and read at the first debate and the succeeding ones were carried out strictly according to these byelaws. The first debate was held on January 14th in the school house and after three more were held in the same place, it became evident that the school was too small to accommodate all those who wished to attend so it was decided to hire Mayfield Hall for the purpose. Nine debates were held in this hall, and at every one it was packed to the doors regardless of the weather or the condition of the roads, showing that the public has taken a lively interest in these debates. Some of the subjects were as follows: Resolved (1) That consolidated schools would be a benefit to Prince Edward Island. (2) That women should take as much interest in public affairs as men. (3) That the Doctor is of more benefit to humanity than the lawyer. (4) That the advent of the automobile has been a benefit to P. E. I. (5) That government control would be better to combat the evils of liquor than prohibition. (6) That the drunkard leads a worse life than the gambler. (7) That the farmer should not contract for fertilizer. (8) That it would have been to the benefit of Canada if the U. S. had passed a law twenty five or thirty years ago, to prevent the Canadians from their country. There were other subjects debated which have escaped the memory of the writer.
