Local Life Underwriters Hear Addresses

The Prince Edward Island Life Underwriters Association held a special luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel, yesterday, at noon. Mr. Edwin C. Johnson, C.L.U., manager of the Dominion Life Insurance Co., was the guest speaker and was the special chairman.

Highlighting the meeting were three addresses delivered by the Life Underwriters, Victor S. Lusk, of the Empire Life, R. J. Raupert, C.L.U., of the British Auxiliary Association and Henry Laphorn, "Nationalization of Life Insurance." He pointed out that the life insurance industry was the oldest, co-operative movement in the world in which the people's savings were pooled to their mutual benefit and protection. He stated that certain politicians were advocating nationalization of the business and gave numerous illustrations to prove that efforts to sell life insurance "over the counter" had met with little success wherever it had been attempted. He suggested that the desire of any political party to gain control of these funds could not be for safety and security for this had never been questioned. It was obvious that Government Monopoly would undoubtedly mingle these funds with its other funds and use them for its own purposes, purposes which would be probably contrary to the wishes of the policy holder.

Mr. Raupert's address was entitled "Seeing Tomorrow with the Eyes of Today." He told of an ancient wise man of the East whose daily prayer as he turned his eyes toward Mecca was, "Grant that I may see today with the eyes of to-morrow," and suggested that Life Underwriters should use a somewhat similar prayer but in reverse, "Grant that I may see, Tomorrow with the eyes of today." He pointed out that the merchant and salesman who is far-sighted enough to strive to retain the goodwill of his customers through friendship and square-dealing, will reap the benefits in the post-war period when the shackles of war restrictions are removed.

Mr. Henry Laphorn, a veteran Life Underwriter who was born in the business almost forty years, told of the early days of wriling life on the Island when a horse and wagon was the common means of conveyance. He told of the keen competition between the few companies then doing business and related several humorous stories of his experiences in those early days.
