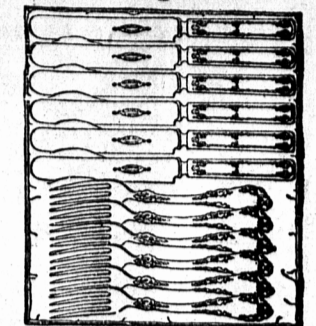

The basement of the Ross block, Sydney, receiving a scorching Saturday evening by a fire which started in the furnace room. The blaze though slight, caused considerable excitement among the tenants of the building. The promptness of the fire department checked the progress of the fire, which was confined to the burning of a portion of a partition or two.

SUPERINTENDENT SHARP and Car Foreman Coffin left last night for Ottawa. They will be joined at Pictou by Mechanical Superintendent Poot. They are going to the capital to give evidence in the final settlement of Contractors Haney and Kitchen with the Government. Messrs Sullivan and Black of the Hillsboro Bridge are now in Ottawa on the same mission.

The Ramblers of Amherst are much disgusted with the action of the managers of the Stanley Cup. The Ramblers challenged for the cup last season, and it was not accepted. Early in January this year they again challenged. They were told by the cup managers to go and get a reputation, and they answered by saying they had defeated the Dawson players who had played for the cup at Ottawa. Then Ottawa wired the Ramblers, suggesting March 11 for the first game. The Ramblers wanted it changed to the 14th. Then came word that the match could not be arranged this year, but in the meantime the holders of the cup have arranged a game with the Victorias of Montreal.

This spring there are indications that there will be a considerable scarcity of seed on Prince Edward Island. Along this line a correspondent writes the North Sydney Herald. He declares that ninety per cent. of the farmers of Cape Breton will be forced to buy seed oats this spring, and many will be obliged to sow less than usual owing to their lacking means to buy a sufficient quantity of seed at the price likely to be asked by retailers. He thinks that the councillors in the several districts should take steps to secure an ample quantity of seed purchased at wholesale prices. For this seed, purchased at first hand, he thinks, free transportation should be asked for over the government railway. If the need be as pressing as the correspondent claims it to be, his suggestion is worthy of consideration.

HALIFAX CHRONICLE.—There has not been much change to note in the market during the week ending March 25th. Receipts have been better and supplies of all kinds available are now considerably better. In butter the market is quiet, and high prices are still pretty well maintained, but buyers are pretty careful in anticipation of lower prices. Creamery is quoted at 25 to 30 cents and prints at 22c. Rolls and dairy prints, 24c. In the Upper Provinces the markets hold pretty firm, with receipts not overly heavy. Eggs continue remarkably scarce for this time of the year. Some of the leading dealers here say they have never seen them so scarce at this time of year. Comparatively few are coming in from the Province, the most of the receipts being from the Upper Provinces. The price too, holds firm for the last week in March 24 cents. Good eggs are quoted at 19 to 20 cents in Montreal. Owing to the bad condition of the roads, the outlook is not for much lower prices at present. The market for Cheese is firm, as the export trade has improved, but demand is not very active here. The price is cheaper here today, than in Montreal, 11 cents being quoted by Halifax jobbers, and 11 1/2 in Montreal. Supplies of meat and fowl are now pretty good and quite equal to the demand at this season.

The wind being in a favorable direction the barns were not in danger and Mr McDonald with the neighbors were able to save some of the furniture. There was some insurance on the house.

The following item is from the "Presbyterian Witness" of recent date. It will be read with interest by many in the province, as a large number of relatives of the late Rev. Samuel Bernard are to be found in P. E. Island, especially in Malpeque and Long River sections:—"On March 8th there occurred in Halifax the death of Mrs. Bernard, widow of the late Rev. Samuel Bernard at one time pastor in Noel congregation. The funeral took place on Noel Presbyterian church, whence also had that of her late husband twenty one years before. The people of this congregation have pleasant and favorable memories of Mr. Bernard's ministry among them, which proved to be his last pastorate. On March 10th a large number from different parts of the congregation gathered in the church to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of one, very worthily beloved by all. Mrs Bernard was 71 years of age."

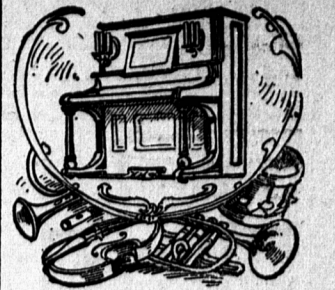
