Nagging, Fault-Finding, Stinginess and Neglect Are Listed as Four Leading Liabilities by Married Women Who Discuss Husbands

What fault in a husband does his wife find it hardest to endure? A group of married women were discussing this subject the other day and, barring philandering, which they all agreed was the unpardonable sin, they found that the following defects in their lords and masters were what took the sugar and spice out of marriage and turned it into dust and ashes in their teeth.



"There isn't anything big or little, from the way the President runs the Government to the strength of the breakfast coffee, that I don't argue over, and if I ever buy a ticket to Reno it will be because I am so longer."

THE COOK'S CORNER

BOTTLED LIME JUICE In order to have a supply of this bottled sunshine for use throughout the winter, it is a good plan to buy limes in the summer months when they are plentiful and inexpensive and bottle the juice. To achieve the best results, the limes should be kept in a cool place for two or three days. The juice should then be strained through fine muslin and poured into small bottles. Care must be taken that the bottles are perfectly dry. Fill them nearly to the top and carefully pour in enough pure olive oil to form an air-tight layer over the surface. Conk lightly and set in a cool dark place. When the lime juice is required, choose a bottle containing as much as you need, for the juice does not keep long after exposure to the air. Dip in a small piece of cotton or rag on a skewer to absorb the oil. You will then find the juice as good as when bottled.

LIME PUNCH 8 cubes sugar, 2 oranges, 2 limes. 1-2 cups water; cracked ice slice of pineapple, 2 crystallized cherries. Rub the cubes of sugar over the rind of the oranges and limes. Then put the sugar in a bowl and pour the juice of the limes and oranges over it. Add the water and serve with plenty of cracked ice. Put in pineapples and cherries at moment of serving. Serves four.

SOUTHERN LIMEADE Make a sugar syrup of 1 cup water and 1/2 cup sugar. To 2 tablespoonfuls of this syrup, place in a tall glass add the juice of one lime and generous cubes of ice. Fill with soda water and serve with slices of lime.

LIME GINGER CUP Place in a tall glass 4 tablespoonfuls cold tea, the juice of one-half lime 2 tablespoonfuls sugar, and 2 or 3 bits of preserved ginger. Stir well, mix in 2 tablespoonfuls cracked ice, and fill up the glass with iced ginger ale. Add a thin slice of lime and cap with a tiny bouquet of fresh mint. The above two recipes are individual servings.

PINEAPPLE JUICE, CANNED Cover the skins, cores and eyes with cold water and bring slowly to a boil. Cover and cook steady for 30 to 40 minutes, then turn into a jelly bag and drain off the juice. Measure this and add 1 cup of sugar to each 5 cups of the juice. Return to the fire and heat until the sugar is dissolved, then boil rapidly for 10 minutes. Turn into hot, sterilized jars and seal immediately. Pineapple marmalade is easy to make and it's really not expensive for the following recipe should make about 12 glasses, possibly more, depending on the size of the pineapple and yet the cost is slight.

PINEAPPLE AND RHUBARB PRESERVES 1 medium sized pineapple 5 lbs. sugar Method: Peel and slice the pineapple and remove the eyes and cores. Shred with a silver fork or put through the food chopper, reserving all the juice. Turn into a preserving kettle, adding a very little water if necessary, to prevent
