### Vermont Suffers From Heavy Storm

RUTLAND, Vermont, Nov. 5.—Restored partly to communication with the outside world this evening after having been isolated for 24 hours, this city was able to recount a loss of two dead and damage of \$100,000 to bridges and highways alone. The situation was still precarious with rain falling and the waters in the 1500 acre lake at Chittendon Dam, continuing to mount.

### Drowned In His Own Blood

(Canadian Press.) FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Nov. 8.—"Drowned in his own blood" was apparently the fate of Charles McKenzie, aged 20, who was pinned beneath his automobile when the machine skidded on a slippery road and turned over into a ditch on Saturday. It became known today that McKenzie was thrown from his seat and an iron bar, supporting the engine, caught him across the nose breaking it and pinning him to the ground, unable to move even a fraction of an inch, blood streamed from his nose, drained into the youth's mouth and entered his lungs, actually drowning him. His companion who escaped injury, was unable to extricate him and McKenzie died within a few minutes.
