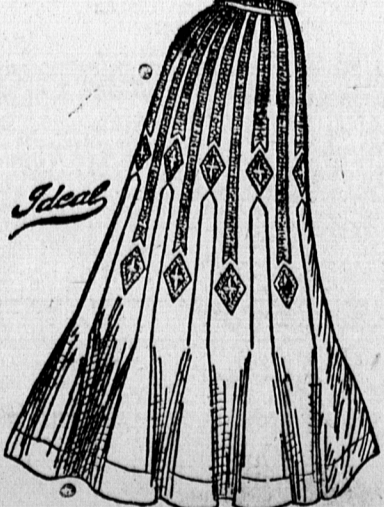

THE GUARDIAN'S BICYCLE ROAD RACE

The date of The Guardian's bicycle road race has been definitely fixed for Monday August twenty-four. If this date should prove unfavorable the race will take place on the following evening. Entries are to be confined to Prince Edward Island riders alone. The race is for The Guardian's three year trophy, but in addition there will be a number of other prizes which will be announced in a few days. The course begins at The Guardian office in Charlottetown and follows Grafton Street to Great George Street, thence continuing on to the Upper Malpeque Road which it follows to this side Milton station, thence taking the road to the left which runs alongside Moore's Mill stream and on to Warren's Corner, North River. From this corner the course will be across the North River Bridge to the Royal Arms, thence by Lower Malpeque Road to Brighton Road following Brighton Road out to the shore, then taking the Park Roadway, following the same round the Park and so to starting place—16 miles.
