Mr. Daniel McPhee, South Shore, was with his brother sawing wood at the home of the latter. An apparatus, worked by horse-power, was used for the purpose and after the men had been engaged in the work for some time the fly wheel broke. It flew about in pieces and struck Mr. McPhee, fortunately not on the head, but on the hand. The injured man was at once driven to Charlottetown where the wound was attended to at the P. E. THE WEATHER, THE TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, February 27.—Moderate west and southwest winds; fair and a little milder.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday the sun shone brightly and the day was considerably milder than has been the case for some time past. The sun melted the snow on the walks, making walking very disagreeable in places where the slush was very deep. The temperature rose as high as 25 degrees above zero yesterday, but fell to 15 above at nine p. m. At nine a. m. it was 14 above; but on the previous night it was below zero, —5 degrees being registered.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 12.37 and tomorrow at 1.02; it will be high tomorrow morning at 12.45 and Saturday at 1.23. The sun sets this afternoon at 5.45 and tomorrow at 5.46; it rises tomorrow morning at 6.40 and Sunday at 6.38.

The moon sets this evening at 8.47. There was a new moon on Tuesday, Feb. 24th at 8.02 p. m.

The first quarter of moon will be on Thursday, March 5th at 1.03 a. m.

The length of today will be eleven hours and three minutes.

COLLIER PICKED UP BY STEAMER

LECTURE BY MR. FROST

(Continued from page 1)

its struggles during civil war, with the raids of Morgan, the famous raider; the Ku Klux outrages, the Kentucky "Night Riding" in the tobacco sections. He then took up the three different sections of Kentucky; the "Fenny Royal" in the West with its razor-back hogs, black tobacco and large negro population; the "Blue Grass," with its caves and caverns, its famous racing stables and its manufactures of whiskey, with a number of anecdotes all illustrating the convivial character of the Kentucky gentleman and with a tribute to the eminence of "Blue Grass" statesmen and authors, and to the high social tone of "Blue Grass" life. Mr. Frost compared the "Blue Grass" region to Prince Edward Island during the summer months. In the three regions of Kentucky treated by the speaker was the mountainous Eastern end which has been called "the backyard of Kentucky" and which is notorious for its feuds and killings as well as for its "Moonshine Whiskey" homebrewed clothes and open-hearted hospitality. Mr. Frost related a number of anecdotes regarding Kentucky feuds and recited a mountain ballad modelled upon the old Elizabethan ballads, which have been transmitted by word of mouth and are still in common usage in the mountain region. These ballads were sung by strolling banjo minstrels who made their living by playing and singing first in one village and then another.

Mr. Frost said that in treating conditions in Kentucky he had frankly selected whatever was picturesque and striking, so that in many cases the conditions which he described would not be typical. Moreover, he described conditions of ten years ago, with which he was familiar. Modern enterprise had sadly altered the old Kentucky life; but the splendid physique of the men, their Saxon origin and the generous climate, would be saving elements with the advent of commercial progress. Most distinctive of all, however, said Mr. Frost, was Kentuckian character and personality. "The Kentuckian is distinguished by pride which is grounded in his self-respect and is the complement of Kentucky courtesy. The second great attribute of the Kentuckian's is his sentiment, which is not a sickly or mawkish moon-madness, but rather a refusal to hold life cheap and common-place, and an insistence upon gallantry to women and courtesy towards men, an innate capacity for enduring human intercourse with dignity, grace and nobility. This is Kentucky's contribution to humanity, which no amount of sordid industrialism can eradicate. Her pure spirit

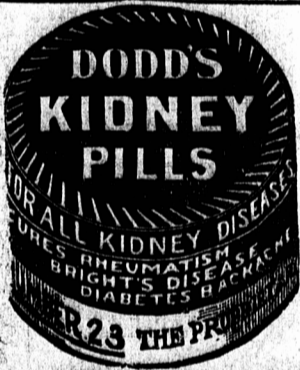
