CALCUTTA'S FAREWELL TO THE KING AND QUEEN.

NEW YORK, January 9.—The New York Times this morning publishes the following despatch from William Maxwell, of the London Daily Mail, from Calcutta:

Calcutta's farewell to the King and Queen today was even more crowded and impressive than her welcome to them. It gives a true measure of the success of the Royal visit. From Bombay to Calcutta it has been a personal and progressive triumph. At every stage of the journey the popular enthusiasm had a new force and a new significance, but it was at Delhi that the real impulse was felt. Lord Morley, before I left London, assured me that it would be politically the most important visit ever paid to India. He spoke with knowledge of the administrative changes to be announced at the Durbar, and he was right in his estimate of their effect. From that moment the King assumed another character in the eyes of India. He passed at one bound from a personal to a political supremacy, and realized the popular conception of a ruler. While this meant to India, we saw at Delhi and Calcutta, when multitudes did homage before the vacant thrones. There was neither servility nor affectation in the amazing demonstration.

They were the natural expression of native reverence and complete submission. This sentiment affected all classes. Even those who at first were inclined to criticize the administrative changes, accepted them as the acts of the Emperor. The effect has been universal and instantaneous. A new atmosphere has been created.

Bengal, about which there had been forebodings, responded to the common impulse. It is only just to say that neither the King nor the government shared these fears. The Bengal is an emotional race, and the partition of Bengal was a sentimental, if unreal, grievance.

It would be folly to assume that this will end all the agitation in Bengal. The political agitation will still be seen in Bengal and elsewhere, but a new spirit will animate and direct it, and for this new spirit the Indian reformers have taken off their coats to the sun after buttoning them to the wind, and it is true here, as in other countries, that the masses follow their leaders. This reconciliation is the greatest achievement of the visit, and it will not

HUGE SEA SWEEP OVER STEAMER BOSTON.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Jan. 8.—The D. A. R. steamer Boston, Captain Simmins from Boston, arrived here at 11.45 Saturday morning nearly five hours late, and with two of her lifeboats gone.

Her officers report the trip the worst of the season and were forced to run on greatly reduced speed most of the way over. The steamer struck the storm at about ten o'clock Friday night, the worst period being about midnight. At about a quarter past twelve a heavy sea from port swept completely across the ship and carried away two of the starboard boats. The Boston brought about two hundred passengers who were very sick on the passage.

JOURNALIST DIES CROSSING OCEAN.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—With the arrival today of the steamship Saxonia from Liverpool, came the first authentic account of the death at sea of John Ward Hunt, a New York newspaper writer.

Hunt, according to wireless despatches telling of his disappearance was not washed overboard, but according to the best belief of the officers and passengers of the ship, deliberately leaped into the sea some time after dinner Christmas night, and was not missed until the following morning.

The sea at the time was smooth and there was not the least possibility, they say of a person falling over the rail Hunt seemed to be in a perturbed condition on the evening of his disappearance.

185 MURDERS, NOBODY HANGED.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 8.—One hundred and eighty five murders have been committed in Chicago in 1911 and there have been no hangings. Highwaymen and Black Hand agents were responsible for an alarming percentage of these crimes. There have been 523 cases of suicide.

Here is a list showing the methods employed by those committing suicide: Asphyxiation, 115; cutting, 20; drowning, 19; hanging, 60; jumping from windows, 13; jumping from buildings, 3; jumping from trains, 3; poisoning, 150; starvation, 3; shooting, 13.

WHOLE COUGHS UP & SMALL FORTUNE. BROCKTON, Mass., Jan. 9.—William H. White of No. 28 Chapel street, Brooklyn, N. Y., considers who while walking along Nantasket Beach Christmas Day, came across a large chunk of some foreign substance which he took home, suspecting he had something valuable.

Breaking off a piece of the strange mass he brought it to City Chemist Charles S. Boling for analysis. Mr. Boling subjected the matter to a number of careful tests, and finally discovered that it yielded all the properties of ambergris, that precious matter that is used in cologne making. The standard rate for ambergris is \$60 an ounce so the mass White found is worth \$19,200. "Nothing takes the place of ambergris in the finer grades of perfume," said Boling. "The matter was coughed up by a sick whale, and because of its scarcity it is very valuable."
