All the above are stake races, and thirty-two horses have been nominated in same, last payment due on August 4th, when horses must be named. Don't forget to send your last payment, DO IT NOW.

Purses divided 50, 25, 15, and 10 per cent of purses. Races to finish at the end of fifth heat, when money will be divided according to summary. All mile heats in harness. Any horse distancing the field or any part thereof entitled to one money only. Two or more horses trained or owned in the same stable, may start in the same class, when full entrance is paid on both. National Trotting Association rules to govern, except where they conflict with the above conditions.

Special trains will run from Summerside and Charlottetown, fares and particulars of which will appear later. Montague Horse Races have always been noted for their good meal tables, and they will not be behind their high standard this year. There will also be well stocked Ice Cream and refreshment saloons, and the usual amusements.

Positively no automobiles will be allowed to run from the public main road, to and from the race track grounds, and owners of cars will bear this in mind, and govern themselves accordingly.

The S. S. Enterprise will make an excursion trip from Pictou, N. S., on this date, bringing over horses and people from Pictou, New Glasgow, etc. Teams will meet the trains and boat and convey the public to the race track grounds, where you can get a good dinner at a reasonable rate.

Montague has one of the best tracks in the Maritime Provinces, and you will see one of the biggest races ever held on any track in the Province, on August 15th. Come along and bring your friends with you.
