The Purposes of Boy-Scout Girl Guide Week Scout and Guide Week, Feb. 17-24

The purposes of this annual observance by 170,000 Canadian Scouts and Guides are briefly:

1. A re-emphasis on Baden-Powell's original Scouting and Guiding principles as an aid to good citizenship.
2. To make Scouts and Guides conscious of opportunities for community service.
3. To secure the return to leadership in the Movement of former Scout and Guide Leaders who have been in the Forces.
4. To instill in Scouts and Guides the pride of belonging to a world-wide fellowship.
5. To emphasize to Scout and Guide Leaders the importance of the task they have undertaken for Canadian youth.
6. To better inform the public of the aims and objects of the Scout and Guide programmes and to secure more active co-operation of adults in Association affairs.

Rally Opens Scout, Guide Week Here

Boy Scout and Girl Guide Week was officially opened in Charlottetown yesterday in the Prince of Wales College auditorium by His Honour Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Bernard. Scout Leader of Troop No. 6 James Gauthier, presided. The large number of Boy Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies present, together with the large attendance of citizens was sufficient evidence of the popularity of the movement originated by the late Field Marshal Baden-Powell. On the platform were His Honour Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Bernard and Mrs. Bernard, Premier J. Walter Jones and Mrs. Jones, Mrs. J. Y. Reay, Provincial Girl Guide Commissioner; K. M. Martin, K.C., Boy Scout Provincial Commissioner; R. S. P. Jardine, Provincial President; and Lieut.-Colonel W. W. Reid, D.S.O., Director of Physical Fitness.

The Lieut.-Governor in opening the rally, commended the Scouts and Guides on their fine appearance and stressed the importance of their living up to the high ideals of the Boy Scout movement. The organization had contributed

Reid referred to the great work done by Scouts and Guides in the war-torn countries of Europe, England, Holland and Italy.

As director of physical fitness in the Province, Col. Reid urged the boys and girls to get the "out" out of scouting by pursuing outdoor activities, such as camping, swimming, and hiking. He told the Scouts and Guides that many ex-service men and women had gained much valuable knowledge through Scouting and Guiding — knowledge which had proved valuable to them in later years.

Col. Reid said he felt that youth, in order to take advantage of the fun and adventure of life should have perfect health. This, he said, would always remain their most valuable possession and he emphasized the necessity of their continuously striving to attain it and to keep it after it was attained.

In the morning Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies attended services in their respective churches. Today Scouts and Guides will address the Rotary and other service clubs. Tonight Mr. R. S. P. Jardine, Provincial Boy Scout President, will broadcast at 6:10 over CFCY.

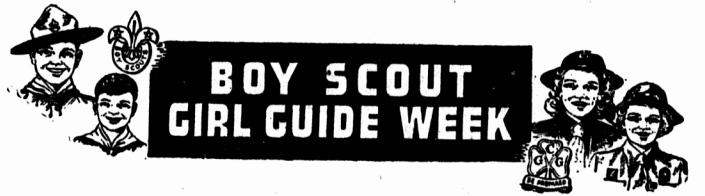
Worthy Youth Movements

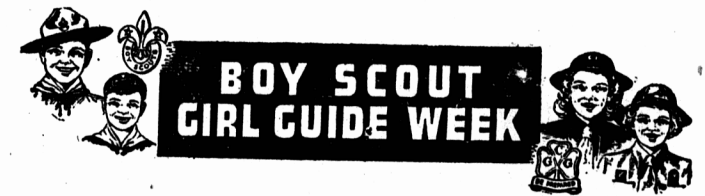
