WHEAT POOL'S CROP ESTIMATE

GIVES 272,000,000 BUSHELS WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 9—Estimated wheat production for the prairie provinces is 272,000,000 bushels, according to figures issued tonight by A. Cairns, statistician for the Canadian wheat pool. The figure, termed the pool's "preliminary estimate," is far below the pool's final estimate of 525,000,000 bushels last year, but higher than many recent forecasts of the prairie wheat yield.

APHIS ON ROOT CROPS—The dry weather has assisted in developing a considerable plague of aphids attacking the foliage of the root crops. The Provincial Department of Agriculture advises that for turnips especially the late varieties which are more liable to injury from this parasite, pulling the turnips, tops and all, will prevent the spread of this destructive pest, or at least delay their spread to adjacent plants. If a turnip patch of an early variety becomes infested, the leaves will soon be eaten off and the crop practically destroyed unless care is taken that the plants earliest affected are pulled at once and fed to livestock. We see a number of fields throughout the country becoming more or less affected and we would strongly advise farmers to keep on the lookout for this pest and on its first appearance pull the infested tops. Driving through the fields with a horse and cart most of the infested areas can be detected and the turnips in these areas pulled for feed without the slightest injury to the rest of the growing crop. Prompt action in this way it is suggested, will save a large yield of roots.

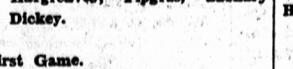
