93,000 Fans, Including King And Queen, Will Witness English Cup Final Today

LONDON, April 29—(CP Cable)—Sunderland and Preston North End, two famous football clubs, clash at Wembley Stadium, Saturday in what promises to be a memorable English Cup final. The teams will play before 93,000 spectators including the King and Queen and a crowd of Empire notables prominent among whom will be many of the Indian princes.
Unless nerves—much in evidence at recent Wembley finals—take a hand, the great pre-coronation match should prove a gruelling struggle until the last minute. Sunderland, English League Champions last season, is gunning for its first Cup while its Lancashire rival has been successful once—back in 1889.

Sunderland Slight Favorite
Preston is a clever, workmanlike team with a powerful forward line led by Frank O'Donnell, new Scottish international, but Sunderland is generally favored by reason of its all-round strength and consistency. The Roker Park outfit has been dubbed the "team of all the talents".
Holdercroft, Preston's international goalkeeper, is still on the injured list and the team will be the same as that which defeated West Bromwich Albion 4-1 in the semi-finals. Sunderland will play at full strength. McNab coming in at left-half for Hastings, a member of the team that triumphed 2-1 over Millwall three weeks ago.
All the players have been training lightly during the week. Sunderland's squad near London and Preston at its home enclosure at Deepdale.
The teams visited Wembley today to size up the big pitch, in perfect condition for the contest. Only one match has been played on the ground this season.
Thousands of fans are disappointed over the refusal of officials of both teams to agree to the Football Association's suggestion that the players be numbered. Reasons for the decision was not disclosed.

Scalpers Reaping Harvest
As usual the demand for tickets greatly exceeds the supply and speculators are reaping a harvest. Cashing in on the double event
they are offering coronation seats in exchange for Cup final tickets and making a handsome profit both ways.
Back in 1887, seven years after the club was formed, Preston played through the season without losing a match and since then has been called the Invincibles.
Surviving members of the 1887 squad have been invited to a club banquet after Saturday's match.
Transportation systems have had a busy time arranging for the heavy influx to the capital. Railways will operate scores of excursions from all over England and particularly Durham and Lancashire, home counties of the clubs. Thousands will travel by road and air.
