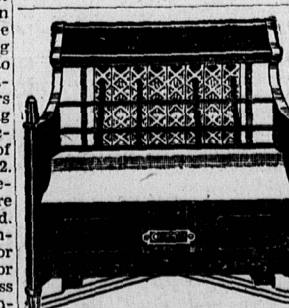

THE MYSTERY OF PARIS

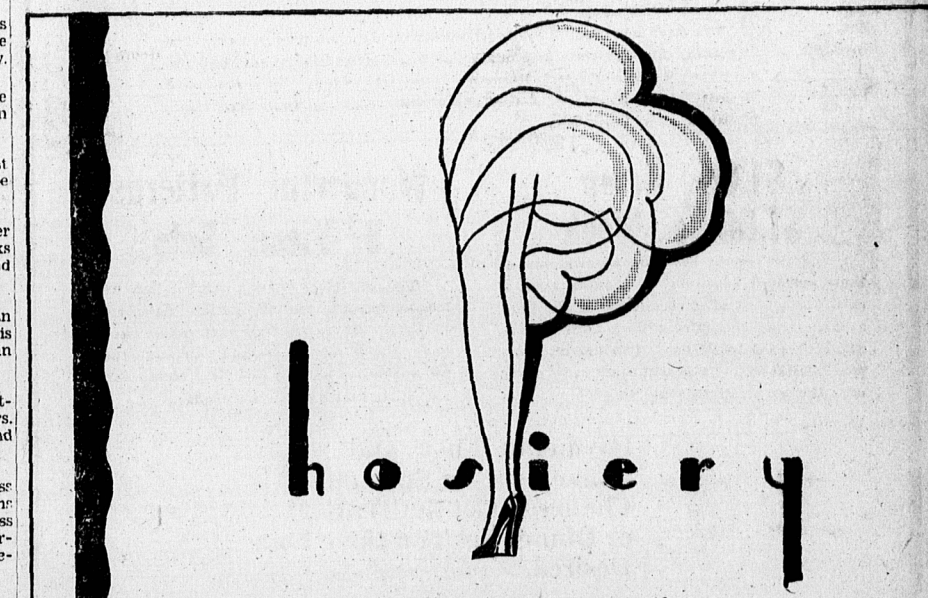

EDUCATING INDIAN CITIZENS.

The expenditure by the Government of Canada on Indian education in the fiscal year 1926 was \$1,918,000. In addition to this certain bands of Indians, whose funds were sufficient to meet the expenditure, contributed \$67,000 for school purposes.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER IN CANADA

By the end of the year 1926 Canada's hydraulic power installation reached a total of 1,556,288 horsepower with that 265,838 horsepower was installed during that year.

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
