Soldiers Civil Re-Establishment

Two points stand out as indicative of the character of the services rendered to the ex-members of the Forces by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment. One is the large number of personal cases dealt with directly each day. The other is the relatively low cost of administering these services.

The average total number of men dealt with per day during a week of the current period is 27,746. The administrative expenses necessary to provide such service forms but 10 per cent of the total departmental expenditures. Figures relating to similar work in the United States show administrative expense in the latter country as being 30 per cent of the total expenditure.

This information is taken from the comprehensive summary of the work of the Department presented to the Select Parliamentary Committee now considering "Bill 10" concerning the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.

Further examination of the financial schedules provided for the information of the Committee show that 46.6 per cent of the total expenditures of the Department consists of cash allowances paid directly to ex-members of the Forces and their dependents. This expenditure during the fiscal year 1918-1919 and up to July 31 of the current year amounted to \$7,847,221. Figures relating to similar work in the United States show administrative expense in the latter country as being 30 per cent of the total expenditure.

As an indication of the immense amount of business transacted by the Department it is shown that the average number of letters received each day at the Head Office reaches the amazing total of 4,300.

In the recapitulation of activities of personal services rendered by the Department it is stated that the Medical Services deal with an average of 13,418 cases each week. These services provide for the patients on strength in hospitals, the insane, the tuberculous, the outpatients who receive treatment in clinics, and those rendered services with respect to fitting, repairs or adjustments of artificial limbs, orthopaedic and surgical appliances.

Such cases reach a weekly total of 13,418 and include 99 patients described as "incurable," the latter is an exceedingly small number considering the total casualties sustained by the Canadian Forces.

The Vocational Branch deals with a weekly average of 22,078 cases. This includes those undergoing industrial re-training in schools and industries, the number taking curative training in ward occupations and curative workshops in Hospitals, and the number of men surveyed and personally interviewed as to eligibility for training.

The information and Service Branch renders an average weekly service to 21,650 men. There is an average weekly total of 3,650 applications for placement in such employment opportunities. The specific personal applications for definite information on various subjects total 18,000 each week.

To supply artificial limbs for disabled men the Department established a factory for the purpose, this being the first instance of a Government operated plant of such character. This enterprise was added to the establishment of shops for the manufacture and supply of orthopaedic boots. In each instance the highest skill available was secured so that the best possible appliances may be offered. These appliances and this service is offered without cost to the men.

Up to the end of August this Branch of the Department had supplied 2,719 artificial legs and 1,332 artificial arms. There had also been issued 4,149 pairs of special orthopaedic boots. Minor orthopaedic appliances and surgical appliances, including spectacles, eye-glasses, elastic bandages and surgical splints had been issued to the extent of 10,731.

In connection with the manufacture of artificial limbs it is interesting to note that the average cost of the government-made artificial leg, including the cost of material, labour and overhead expenses, is \$62.24 each. Against this the average cost of artificial legs privately manufactured, according to quotations to the Department from manufacturers, is \$120 each.

The hospital accommodation provided by the Department includes general treatment hospitals entirely under control of the Department

operated by its own staff, general treatment hospitals operated by civil or other authorities in which Department has definite arrangements for the use of beds; tuberculosis sanatoria operated in which the Department has arrangements for the use of beds. The Department operates one hospital for mental cases and has arrangements for space in 26 other hospitals for the treatment of mental diseases operated by Provincial and other authorities. In all there is provision for 5,429 beds in 83 hospitals throughout Canada.

Wherever there is accommodation available in military hospitals and the plan is feasible, ex-soldier patients on the strength of the Department may receive treatment in towns and cities where there are no military hospitals or where no arrangements for a definite number of beds has been made, or when the patient is too ill to be moved he is treated in city hospitals. His home, special arrangements made to treat each case under a general understanding that has been reached with practically every civilian hospital in Canada. This arrangement is of medical advantage to the patient as well as economical to the country as a whole. It obviates the necessity of furnishing transportation for long distances, and at the same time shortens the period during which the patient is away from his work. Exception is made in connection with orthopaedic and neurological cases. There are certain definite medical centres where the best physicians and specialists, and surgeons are available. In general these patients are transferred to such centres.

It was found that the sanatorium accommodation for the treatment of those suffering from tuberculosis was inadequate to meet even the needs of the civilian population. Active steps were therefore taken to arrange for the extension of existing tuberculosis sanatoria. The expense in this connection has been shared equally by the sanatorium authorities and the Department. This policy resulted in the addition of 1,722 beds to the tuberculosis sanatorium accommodation that existed prior to the war. So long as the Department needs this accommodation it is at its disposal, and will then be given over to the authorities operating the sanatoria to the general benefit of the community.

Summarizing the work done by the Information and Service Branch of the Department, the statement shows that up to the end of the first week of September 76,046 ex-members of the forces had applied for placement in touch with employment opportunities. Of this number 69,030 had been placed in employment, being 90.6 per cent of applications received.

To this Branch men apply for information on various subjects concerning either their service of the Department, or their service in respect to 371,312 specific requests for information have been dealt with by the officers of this branch.

It is noted in the statement that in compiling figures as to the number of men dealt with each week, no account is taken of any service other than that rendered by direct personal contact.

There are many other interesting items in the statement of the departmental activities presented to the Committee, but it requires a fairly large volume to deal with the work undertaken on behalf of the ex-members of the forces, and it is impossible to adequately summarize in briefer space.

As an evidence of the work entailed in the presentation of this statement and the various financial schedules accompanying it, one financial statement represents an aggregation of over 17,000 totals taken from subsidiary ledgers showing on Hollerith cards totals which are made up of over two million entries in accounting records for the period dealt with.

It may be seen that the problem of dealing with Canada's great adventure has been undertaken in a manner both efficient and effective.
