Defending Champions Lead Bowlers

HALIFAX, May 17 (CP) — Defending champions Halifax Conn-Martel led the 14-team field at the end of the second day of play tonight in the five-day Nova Scotia-Prince Edward Island bowling tournament here.

Conn-Martel picked up nine of a possible twelve points in three matches today to boost its point total to 20, two better than three teams tied for second place.

Tied with Conn-Martel at the end of yesterday's opening round matches, Halifax Imperials gained only seven. But New Waterford All Stars and Truro scooped into the three-cornered runner-up tie with Imperials by nailing 11.

Joe Connors of Charlottetown came up with the high single to date, a 148. Rod Johnson of Imperials rolled 371 for the high three so far.

Imperials have the top team single and three with 606 and 1728.

Boston Red Sox Open Home Stand With 4-3 Win Over Chicago Team

Boston's stumbling Red Sox yesterday (Tuesday) opened a lengthy home stand by shading Chicago's revitalized White Sox 4-3. A two-run homer by Vern Stephens in the eighth inning gave the Red Sox the victory. It was Stephens' ninth of the year.

Three night games were scheduled in the American League. Left handed Mel Parnell, Boston's only consistent pitcher, won his fifth victory.

The Bostonians couldn't do much with Chicago's Randy Gumpert, but managed to use their eight hits in more timely fashion.

New York Yankees collected 15 singles and a home run but had to battle all the way before beating Cleveland Indians 4-3 before 73,150 fans, largest crowd of the season at Yankee Stadium.

Ed Lopat yielded seven hits, including homers by Larry Doby and Mickey Vernon in posting his fourth victory of an unbeaten season.

Rookie southpaw Alex Kellner won his third relief pitching victory in four games when he hurled Philadelphia to 9-2 triumph over St. Louis Browns. Hank Majeski supplied the batting punch, driving in five runs.

Detroit Tigers capitalized on the wildness of Walter Masterson and Forrest Thompson to score four runs in the last two innings and defeat Washington Senators 4-2.

Johnny Lipton's single with the bases loaded in the ninth gave the Tigers their margin of victory.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

The Maritime Border "Senior B" League is in great danger of being a still-born baby if the mainland teams who were supposed to be a part of the scheme do not wake up and show a lot more enthusiasm about the idea. When a centre like Amherst doesn't even bother to have representatives at a meeting held right in their town, and a meeting which island representatives were put to considerable expense to attend, it looks as if Charlottetown and Summerside may as well forget about mainland competition, at least in league play, and try to work up a league within the confines of their own shores.

It might be just as well to stick to the intermediate division, as all the mainland teams playing the same caliber of ball are apparently under the intermediate banner again this year. It is possible a league might be formed among Charlottetown, Summerside and the local R. C. A. F. line. If the air men could muster a little more strength this trio should furnish ball fans some exciting ball games throughout the summer, and together with exhibition games with Harmon Field, and some of the mainland clubs occasionally, make a satisfactory bill-of-fare of baseball entertainment until the playoffs started in the fall.

Then, of course, there would be the Summerside Town League which is expected to have a good season again this year, despite the desertion from their ranks of many of the town's classiest ball tossers. There are still a number of smart ball players left in that circuit and the class of play may surprise everyone. If the competition is close, that is the main factor to hold the interest of the fans, though sloppy fielding might discourage a lot of dyed-in-the-wool fans. Considering the probable personnel of the team, however, the brand of fielding should still be considerably ahead of the sort dished out in many of the rural areas.

Local baseball in its competitive field is making its first move towards getting rolling for the season. The first in the minor ranks to get underway was the Queen Square School League which commenced here on Monday when the Hawks took a close 12-11 decision over the Dodgers in their league opener.

Although no starting dates in regular scheduled play in the senior ranks has been announced yet, the Charlottetown Abegweits and the Summerside Curran and Briggs squad, the two island entries in the Maritime Border Baseball League, will open hostilities this evening at Summerside when they meet in an exhibition tilt at 5:30.

The midweek, bantam and juvenile teams are gradually being molded into shape under the direction of the Department of Physical Fitness, and according to reports yesterday, are planning on getting things really organized by early next week in preparation for the opening of their various leagues.

As far as can be learned at the moment, the City Junior Baseball League is planning on getting its regular schedule underway on or about June the sixth, but in the meantime, all three entries, Knights of Columbus, Charlottetown Victorias and Charlottetown Kinsmen, are getting in their regular practice sessions.

The Department of Physical Fitness is putting the finishing touches to their pre-season reconditioning of the Memorial Field at Victoria Park, and during yesterday workmen were busily engaged with brush and paint giving the bleachers a new coat of paint and had the job about two-thirds completed last evening. They have already done a fine job on the ball diamond and track and with the exception of a few small jobs still left to be done, everything is pretty well in readiness to handle this summer's sporting activities here.

"Canada has Dominion championship tournaments or play-offs for hockey, tennis, basketball and even lacrosse," states a recent Regina report "but the sport with the most participants has never been able to announce an official Canadian champion. Five-pin bowling leads all other sports in number of actual players but east and west alone can't seem to reach a solution.

"The 1949 Western Canada five-pin bowling tournament was recently held in Saskatoon" continues the report "and its success prompted Cam (Saskatoon Star) McKenzle to be named the lack of an all-Canada affair." "At the moment the east and west use different methods of counting and until they can get together on a standard set of rules, the Canadian championship will not take place," Cam wrote.

"Down East they stage what is termed "Canadian Championships" but seldom is there a western entry. Out here they could just as well call their tournament the Canadian Championships. But the West will not go that far. Out here they choose to play for just the plain Western championship, all the time hoping they sometime can get together with the East and hold an official Canadian meet."

While on the subject of bowling, candelpins this time, the two Charlottetown teams, representing the Province in their bid for N.S. and N.E.-P.E.I. titles, have made a good showing in their opening day of play.

The Charlottetown All Stars who are competing at Halifax all this week for the N.S.-P.E.I. Men's Candelpin Championship, were only trailing in second place by two points behind two Halifax entries at the end of the first day's competitions, while the ladies' team, the Ladies Candelpin Champions, who are competing for the N.B.-P.E.I. title at Fredericton, N. B., were holding down third spot with two wins and two losses at the end of the first day of the three-day tournament.

Joe DiMaggio To Don Uniform Next Week

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)— Joe DiMaggio, New York Yankees' \$90,000 bench-warmer, will don a uniform for the first time this season "some time next week," the club announced tonight.

In a statement given at the Yankee-Cleveland game, travelling secretary Arthur (Red) Patterson said that X-rays of DiMaggio's tender right heel taken earlier in the day were encouraging.

"Joe DiMaggio's right heel has been X-rayed by our physicians and showed enough improvement for DiMaggio to give it a try next week," Patterson said. "Joe will get in uniform some next week and practice with the rest of the team."

DiMaggio has been out of uniform since April 12, before the season opened, when new pains in his heel, from which a bone spur was removed last November caused him to be sidelined.

Yankee authorities were unwilling to guess when he would be available for duty. However, one official said that recent talk that Joe might be placed on the disabled list for 60 days "was absurd."

"Who would be foolish enough to put DiMaggio on the inactive list for 60 days?" he asked. "How do we know that he might be in shape to play 45 of those days?" DiMaggio was a spectator at tonight's game. He sat on the Yankee bench, but was dressed in civilian clothes.

The announcement was made while manager Casey Stengel pondered the question of the player limit. The Yanks must cut four players to meet the 25-man limit.
