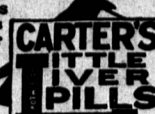

price; other publishers were appealed to but owing to high cost of material, etc., they would not undertake the publication of readers for this Province. The situation became serious and the Educator, Department of the Province of Ontario were appealed to as they use identically the same readers and we had received word that they had been able to secure a contract from T. Eaton & Co., for a limited supply, they granted our request and advised the publishers to supply us with a certain quantity out of their complement at the same prices as obtained by them; as under, primers, 08 cts; 1st Reader 12; 2nd Reader, 18; 3rd Reader 28cts.; 4th Reader 32 cts. I will agree that this is not the same price as stamped on the books but I might inform Mr. Farmer that the difference is paid out of the revenue of that province direct to the publishers thus leaving the pupils of that province as existed a year ago but adding that much more taxes to the people to make up the difference. In regard to Mr. Landrigan I readily admit that he was an educationalist and a gentleman but nevertheless I do not consider that even he could have obtained a better price under the circumstances. All school supplies are sold at cost and no revenue is obtained in the handling of the supplies and I invite anyone who doubts the authenticity of this statement to call at the school supply office where I shall feel it a pleasure to correct any mistaken idea that may exist in regard to this matter. Thanking you Mr. Editor for your valuable space and respectfully asking you to have Mr. Farmer write a letter acknowledging the error of his ways and apologising for trying to slur and cast insinuations at any individual in such a mean and very contemptible manner.
