DIED IN HIS COFFIN

WARSAW, Nov. 21. — In keeping with his reputation as an eccentric, M. Kroplewski, a Warsaw collector of queer objects decided to have his portrait painted as though he were dead and lying in state.

As he already possessed among his collection a coffin and the habiliments usually worn by corpses in Poland, he called in an artist and explained his wishes.

For three days M. Kroplewski clad in an old dress-suit, white cotton gloves, with eyes closed, his hands folded and his face powdered to simulate the pale of death, lay in his coffin on a bier surrounded by lighted candles and wax flowers, while the artist painted.

On the evening of the third day the painting was finished. The artist called to his "sitter" that the task was over, and was surprised to get no answer. Thinking that the eccentric was asleep, he went to wake him. But M. Kroplewski was not to be wakened. He had died of heart failure.

PEASANT TRENDS INVADE FASHION

NEW YORK, Nov. 21. — The fickle fashion, which started the season completely regal in luxury of line and fabric, has made a quick turn about and taken up peasant trends.

The success of the Alpine and the Russian Cossack hats of early fall has led directly to the small felt peasant hat. It follows closely the line of the caps and headresses worn on feast days by European country folk.

Worn back from the face, with turned-up brims, these hats fit in admirably with the fur collared coats. Some are draped high and rigid at the top like a folded kerchief. Others have had-fitting crowns with fluted, up-turned brims. The Dutch cap type, flaring over the ears, makes a new frame for a pretty face.

Brightly figured kerchiefs, tied either back or front, are made to be worn with these new hats. Peasant shoes, flat-heeled and buckled over the instep, complete the costume. These come in red, green or blue morocco leather—a gay note in footwear that has been offered in many a year.

Daytime dresses also show the influence of peasant costumes. There is the Mother Hubbard yoke-line and the smocked vestee front—both effective details for simple, wearable dresses of black or colored silk. Full sleeves shirred into tight cuffs and full skirts shirred into the waistline are other manifestations of the trend.

BRUDENELL WINS TUG OF WAR CHAMP'SHIP

The spirits of the Brudenell Potato Slingers ran high on Tuesday night at Bedque Rink when they captured the Provincial tug-of-war trophy for lightweight teams donated by Hon. Heath Strong, before over five hundred enthusiastic tug-of-war fans. Prince, Queen's and King's Counties all were represented.

The night was cold but that did not deter the teams and their supporters from being on hand in numbers and they were rewarded by some rugged battles for the supremacy in tug-of-war arena of the province.

The first pull was Brudenell vs. Lower Bedque. Both pulls won by Brudenell, the first in fifteen seconds and the second in forty seconds.

Victoria Cross vs. Carleton won by Victoria Cross in both tugs. The first in twenty-two seconds and the second in thirty seconds.

Kinross vs. Middleton, won by Kinross, the first in nineteen seconds and the second in thirteen seconds.

Brudenell Potato Slingers then pulled with Upper Preetown. The Preetown boys made a determined effort to win from this champion King's County team. The first pull lasted for the full time of three minutes and just as time was called it was an exciting tug but Victoria Cross won both pulls, the first in two minutes and thirty seconds and the second in two minutes and seven seconds.

Prince and Queen's Counties were now eliminated, and it remained for the two King's County teams to decide the cup ownership. Brudenell Potato Slingers vs. Victoria Cross faced one another on the rope. Brudenell was in charge of the Kilmur coach, Treville Saunders, and Allen Nicholson had the Victoria Cross team under his hand. It is well worth any one's time to have seen these two experienced coaches handle their teams in this contest. Both teams are well trained but Brudenell had the advantage last night, pulling their opponents in both tugs. The first was an exciting tug but the second in one minute and ten seconds, and with the victory the trophy.

At the conclusion the Hon. Heath Strong presented the trophy to Captain James MacDonald of the Bedque Rink. Mr. Strong complimented them on their victory and also complimented all the teams on the sportsmanship they displayed. He stated that he gave the cup on two conditions only, that it would be contested for in the Bedque Rink and that any team who would win it three times then it would become their property. He also congratulated the management of the rink on the excellent manner in which they had conducted all the contests this season. At the conclusion of the presentation the boys honored the donor of the cup and the captain of the winning team and the coach, after which all the teams present sat down to a hot lunch prepared by the ladies of the Central Bedque Institute, which was much appreciated by the boys.

This ended the tug-of-war contests in the Bedque Rink for this season and although they have been running for three years now the interest seems greater than ever and the boys of Prince County last night asked they were going to make a determined effort next fall to bring the cup back to Bedque.
