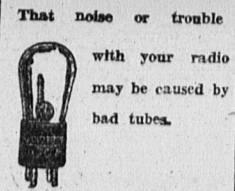

—EASTERN APPROACH COMPLETED—The new concrete roadway on Main St. East is now open. The building of this road has at last given a proper front entrance to Summerside. The road in all is about 500 feet long. On the town side it is about 300 feet long, tapering in a graceful curve from 28 feet to 25 feet at the bridge. On the east side, the road tapers from 25 feet at the bridge to 20 feet where it connects with the old pavement. The curved portion of the road is banked 14 inches on the outside. The top of the bridge was found to be low on the outside, making it necessary to raise it six inches at this point. The new top is of Warrenite Asphaltic Concrete. The whole is a splendid bit of work reflecting much credit on the Engineer and contractors. —S

—ISLANDER OFFICIATES AT ANNIVERSARY—Island friends would be interested in a brief account of the 125th anniversary of St. James Church, Antigonish, as the pastor, Rev. E. Lockhart, is an Islander, being born at Spring Valley, the son of the late George and Adelaide Lockhart. Rev. Mr. Lockhart read the historical sketch of the church from its inception in 1797, when Rev. James Munro served as itinerant minister. The early church was Presbyterian and before there was any church at Antigonish the services were held at a Mr. Symond's house. The Presbyterian Church enjoyed an unbroken history until June 10, 1925, when it joined the United Church. Rev. James Munro by deed of gift September 17, 1805, donated an acre of land on the south east corner of Main and Church Streets for the erection of a church, school house and burying ground. In Rev. E. Lockhart's account of the church, he describes the second church, built to replace the original structure, which had become inadequate, as having a wine glass pulpit, or one of the old fashioned high pulpits, with a narrow base, which were used in the earlier days. Rev. Mr. Lockhart is the twelfth pastor since the founding of the church and was appointed in 1927. S.

The Romance of the Tartans

Most Englishmen know nothing of the tartans but what they see of them when worn by the Scottish regiments. These kilts are mainly sombre, but there are a number of tartans, seldom seen in the south, that are veritable riots of color.

The Dress Stewart tartan with its basal of white that was brought into the limelight by Queen Victoria is not half as gaudy as the old

Jacobite one, with its terra-cotta ground, green squares, and red, white and blue pattern.

The Royal Stewart tartan worn by the pipers of the Black Watch and Scots Guards is gay enough, but it pales before the medley of red, blue, yellow and white of the Oglvie, or the bold yellow and black of the MacLeod.

Ruthless persecution can eventually kill anything, and the park measures taken to exterminate the clans after the "45" rising caused the death of the tartan industry. It was forbidden, under fearsome penalties, to wear Highland dress, and there was but a tiny spark of clan life flickering by the time the tartan was allowed once more.

It is slightly ironical that this spark was fanned into a steady flame by descendants of the hated "German Prince"; but George IV, and later Queen Victoria, helped to feed the fire that now burns steadily so that a Scotsman is still as proud of the hall-mark of his clan as ever he was in past ages.
