 THE DOMINION ANNIVERSARY.

It is already a far call backward to the days when the Dominion of Canada had its birth in the midsummer of 1867. On July 1 of that year the four Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were united by proclamation of good Queen Victoria under the terms of the British North America Act. Lord Monck was appointed the first Governor General, Hon. John A. McDonald became the first Premier, with the titular distinction of Knight Commander of the Bath, and seventy-two Senators were appointed for life.

Tomorrow will be the thirty-ninth anniversary of that notable event and United Canada will enter upon the fortieth year of its existence. Only a few remain of the great men who shared in the work of bringing the Provinces together and those who were in their prime in 1867 are old men now. But the period of a generation that has since elapsed has abundantly vindicated the work and the workmen. British North America could not have attained to what it is today, the right arm of a world-wide Empire, but for the great achievement of the men of '67.

This work of nation-building seemed slow and painful when in progress; it involved something of self-surrender from every one of the uniting Provinces and not least from our French-speaking compatriots. They were to be ever afterward in a minority in the nation, subjected more or less to the control of a majority differing from them in speech, in blood and religious faith. The smaller Provinces also had to take much on trust. Even now, after almost forty years, there is much to be adjusted if viewed in detail. But such a work must be judged "in the large," to be justly appreciated.

What we see today is the four Provinces increased to nine; our then comparatively narrow boundaries moved westward from the great lakes to the Pacific and northward to the pole; our population doubled; the nine Provinces linked together by bands of steel where before each stood isolated; a vast area of wild lands brought under cultivation; a vast expansion of revenue, of industry of commerce, in a word a strong, young, prosperous, contented and happy nation developed from the straggling communities that existed before along the Atlantic seaboard, the St. Lawrence and the lakes. In its first years the Dominion was severely buffeted by adverse influences. The threatened secession of Nova Scotia, the crises developed over the Alabama claims and the fishery controversy; Fenian invasions from across the border and successive rebellions in the Northwest, were among the seismic shocks that threatened to shake down the goodly fabric ere yet its walls had been completed or the mortar hardened to give it stability. The element of time was needed to make all solid. Time was needed to develop the national life and the national spirit, and this has been accomplished.

There is some sort of parallel between the growth and development of the national capital and the nation itself. By-town was a crude lumber village, almost isolated in the forest when Queen Victoria selected it as the capital of Canada and gave it a new name, and our present noble King, then the Prince of Wales, laid the corner stone of our now splendid Parliament Buildings. Ottawa and its national buildings are now the pride of half a continent. So, too, the Canada of that day was crude and primitive while today six millions of

prosperous, progressive and enlightened people rejoice in the name Canadian.

To some it seemed the language of hyperbole when the noble Lord who introduced the British North America Bill in Parliament said, "We lay today the foundation of a great state which may one day overshadow even ourselves." We can all now see, and the world takes cognizance of the fact, that it was indeed the foundation of a great state that was laid in 1867. And, sinking for the time our Island disabilities and grievances, looking to time to remedy them, and taking the hopeful, national view, may we not say with McGee, that the Act of Union was a glorious and most timely charter, all of whose provisions were honestly meant and fairly meant towards every Province?

We of Prince Edward Island have not yet realized all that we hoped for from the union, but we rely upon the fairness and justice of our fellow Canadians to yet carry out the spirit of the compact and to make all just and equal. And with this reliance we join with all heartiness in the celebration of Dominion Day, full of hope, confident of the future and "never doubting that clouds will break."

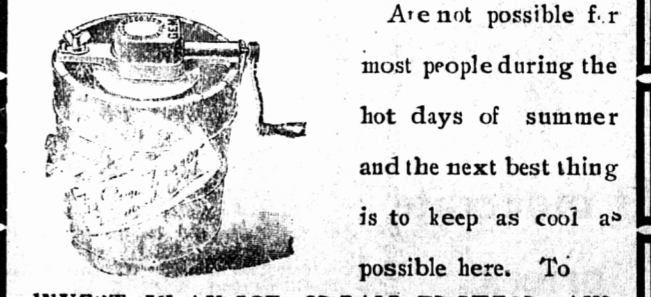
